Though we do request address changes through the Post Office, you will not get your current SAPLings, and the address changes we get usually take several weeks to get to us. Additionally, the Post Office charges us for

returned *SAPLings*! If you change your email address and you have not requested a paper *SAPLings*, we have essentially lost communication with you!

If you collect membership envelopes from new/ renewing Friends, please send them in ASAP (to the mailing address noted above). Our membership documentation process takes about two weeks under the most efficient procedures. # Friends of the San Antonio Public Library Board Meeting

Sunday, May 19, 2013, 2:00 p.m. Submitted by Pat Peak, Secretary

The Friends of the San Antonio Public Library met on Sunday, May 19 at the Forest Hills Branch Library. The meeting was called to order by the President, Linda Arronge. Roll call was read by the Secretary. Board Members present were: Linda Arronge, Beverly Duran, Pat Peak, Nancy Gandara, Walter Ague, Pat Bjornson, Arline Braswell, Jackie Fremming, Bruce Gill, Delores Huber, Yolanda Kirkpatrick, Karen Matson, Pat Mendiola, Larry Purkey, Liz Purkey, Ann Springer and Jill Zimmerman. Aaron and Pat Konstam asked to be excused due to illness. The President declared that a quorum was present and thanked the staff and Friends at Forest Hills for their hospitality.

Approval of Minutes of March 17, 2013. Karen Matson moved to accept the minutes as printed in the April/ May Saplings. Jackie Fremming seconded and the minutes were approved as printed.

**President's Report:** Linda Arronge reported that City Council has approved two new library branches, one in District 2 and one in District 9.

The Media Website Committee has met and among other projects, they are working on providing a PayPal account for on-line purchases.

The Library Foundation luncheon had a good turn-out. The feedback on the San Antonio version of the Texas Book Festival was quite positive, and plans are underway for next year with a proposed date of April 5, 2014. The Foundation thanked all the Friends who participated as volunteers.

*Treasurer's Report:* The Treasurer, **Beverly Duran**, provided copies of the Report. Year to date income for

FOSAPL as of April 30, 2013, is \$29,217.04. Net Assets for FOSAPL use is \$89,486.00. The report will be filed for audit. The Treasurer pointed out that the tax increase in San Antonio to 8.25% will be reflected in the tax amount charged back for Branch book sales.

In response to a question from Nancy Gandara about the high balance of the Brook Hollow Friends' account, Bruce Gill reported that the Brook Hollow Friends are waiting for approval from Central Library Administration to complete their planned expenditure.

Library Board of Trustees Report: Jean Brady sent a note to thank the volunteers who helped with the San Antonio Book Festival. She also advised that the citizen input meetings for the upcoming City of San Antonio Budget would be scheduled differently this year. There will be just 4 meetings, and they will be located in areas encompassing more than one City Council District. Details will be provided to the Friends when available and the Foundation hopes the Friends will support the library's interests as they have in the past.

Library Administration Report: Assistant Director, SAPL, Kathy Donnellan reported on the progress of the Computer Technology area at Central Library with the \$1.5 million grant to consolidate 80 public computers in one area. The project is scheduled for completion in August. The 2012 Library Bond, which approved two new libraries, is moving ahead. In District 2, property donated by the Schaeffer family has been designated for the site and in District 9, an existing building and property is being surveyed for future construction. June 1 is

the sign-up date for the Mayor's Summer Reading program to include children, teen, and adult reading programs. In response to a question from Walter Ague concerning the Bexar County "BiblioTech" initiative, Kathy replied that plans for the Bexar County electronic library are proceeding; Jill Zimmerman volunteered the information that she serves on the BiblioTech Advisory Board. Kathy said that there is still an existing contract between Bexar County and the City to provide library service to Bexar County residents outside the city limits. At some future time, this contract will be renegotiated.

#### **Committee Reports:**

*Membership:* Christie Smith, Membership Secretary, reported on several membership considerations.

A current membership list will be going out to each Branch Friends group with the suggestion they contact former members who have not renewed their memberships. Currently, 58% of new members from last year have not renewed. Christi plans to analyze membership data and propose methods to expand membership. She reminded Branch representatives to maintain a good supply of membership envelopes at each Branch. If vou receive a new membership application, please get the form back to the Membership chairman as soon as possible. A second mailing of membership cards with coupons for a BookCellar purchase has been delayed due to postage minimum requirements. Christi is also working on a mailing or phone contact to Life Members to request updates of their con-

tact information. We need current information from these members as we don't hear from them year to year unless they send in a donation or a memorial. She provided a detailed written report to the Board outlining specific membership considerations for the Board to consider.

Arts and Letters: Bruce Gill reported for Bob Mason that the Arts and Letters Committee will meet in June to review and recommend procedures for applications. The presentation of Awards is tentatively scheduled for October.

Media Website Committee: Nancy Gandara reported that the committee had met twice and has plans for a soft launch of the website in June to include a Launch Party. They have reviewed websites of other libraries and Friends groups and expect to include a variety of Friendsrelated information, including our By-laws, Purpose Statement, Memo of Understanding between FOSAPL and SAPL as well as a SAPLings archive and pertinent historical data. Suggestions for additions to the website will be appreciated.

BookCellar: Tom Nemeth reported that the BookCellar income was approximately \$2000 more than last year even through the store's closure for construction and the \$.25 "life cycle" discount promotion. The BookCellar received 66 boxes of books from Dr. Dudley Harris as well as a donation from the Southwest Craft Center. Appropriate thank yous have been sent. Igo Branch Library thanked the BookCellar for books donated for their successful book sale.

#### **New Business:**

**Book Sale Suggestions**: **Beverly Duran** reported on the Igo Library's use of the "square" during their recent book sale, which allows use of an electronic device

to scan the customer's credit card for purchases. Customers liked the convenience it offered, and Beverly felt that having the availability of the credit purchase probably increased their sales volume. She will be glad to provide details regarding costs and considerations.

The Maverick Friends had scheduled a book sale the same day as the Igo sale, and the two groups worked out a coupon arrangement so that a book sale patron received a coupon with each purchase, which entitled them to a free book at the other library's sale. This idea helped promote the sale at the other library, and patrons seemed to enjoy the library's method of one library benefitting the other.

# Inventory of Items Purchased by Friends' Groups

#### **Marshall Mundorff—Johnston Library Friend**

I met Marshall Mundorff on May 27. I called him early in the morning and invited

him to lunch. He suggested Jim's, and we met at noon. I arrived early to organize my thoughts and put my questions in order. When Marshall walked in I immediately noticed his American Freedom shirt and U.S. Air Force baseball cap. He reminded me of my grandfather.

Marshall was born on February 7, 1939, in DuBois, Clearfield county, Pennsylvania, which is located about 100 miles northeast of Pittsburgh. I learned that Marshall lived abroad for 2 years and attended high school in Frankfurt, Germany. In 1952, Marshall joined the Air Force for a four-year term. After returning to the states, Marshall met and married his wife, Jeanne, and has been married to her for 47 years. After discussing various aspects of our family life, our focus then shifted to education and a note of enthusiasm filled his voice.

He told me he earned his B.A. from Southeastern Oklahoma University in

1960 and received a Master's degree in industrial education from Highlands University in Las Vegas, New Mexico, in 1978 and subsequently taught at that same university for several years following his graduation. Marshall came to San Antonio in 1986 and immediately was hired by the City of San Antonio's aviation department where he was an aviation expert. Marshall retired from the city in 1997.

After discussing his background, family, and education, we moved on to his involvement with the library system. He told me his wife Jeanne worked for the library for 15 years and was an assistant director at the Johnston branch. I asked Marshall if he was the official "donation box" designer/creator and he modestly replied "that Johnston needed a way to raise money, so I built them a box they could use for cash donations." Marshall admitted that woodworking has been a long-time hobby of his and that he has a wood shop in his home where he does various projects for family and friends. I then told him that he made a box for my branch. Cortez, and he said that he hoped we had finally secured it to the desk so that it wouldn't grow legs and walk off. I didn't have the heart to tell him that we still haven't taken his advice.

He then proceeded to tell me about an antique roll-top desk he's currently refinishing, and I found his pride in a job well done refreshing. I asked him if he had any other interests or hobbies, and he told me he's an active member of the Lion's Club and has been involved with that organization for 36 years. He explained that the Lion's Club provides community service in the San Antonio and surrounding areas. This includes assisting areas of Texas where there has been a natural disaster and providing supplies and necessities to people affected by catastrophe. I found it endearing that he said "I'm willing to help whenever there's need."

We wrapped up our lunch by talking about our love of books, horses, and the sense of freedom and stability that a good education provides. Before I realized it, an hour and a half had passed and we both were amazed at how easily we had fallen into deep conversation and understanding. The check came and I immediately reached for the bill, and Marshall told me he couldn't let me pay for lunch. I told him I appreciated his time and the fact that he told me his life story, and answered my questions. I found a friend and kindred spirit in Marshall. Many thanks, my friend.

#### Meet Pat Horlacher—Cody Library Friend

hen Pat Horlacher moved to San Antonio in 1997 and looked for the library location nearest her new home, she found it was a small converted house on Vance Jackson. Already crowded, that library soon closed and a new building was constructed. Eager to see the new facility, Pat discovered a sign on the circulation desk asking for volunteers. She asked, "When," and has been assisting the Cody staff with the routing function ever since.

As a router aide, Pat receives all the tubs of materials placed on "hold" by library patrons,

scans them into the system, identifies and tags them by the name of the person requesting them, and readies them for placement on the "Hold" shelf. Obviously, one of the biggest changes she has seen is in sheer volume. Back in 1997, delivered materials came to Cody in red bags and the lists were hand-written, and it took two people to handle the volume. Now, with improved systems and computers, Pat manages on her own to a large degree on her shifts. Still, that's about 1300-1500 items on "Hold" at any time at Cody, which is the most highly used

in the City of San Antonio other than the downtown Central location. **Layley Latshaw**, Cody Librarian, says about Pat: "We love her. She is always so positive."

Volunteering wasn't new to Pat. A full-time RVer, Pat had previously discovered unique opportunities including cleaning bones at a mammoth site in South Dakota with Elderhostel and assisting at Corps of Engineers campgrounds across the United States. Some of her favorite RV trips were through Montana, Alaska, and the Far West. Reflecting her love for that part of the country, one of

her favorite authors is **Ivan Doig**, a Montana native whose



work she discovered in a book store in West Yellowstone. These days, she's focusing on the classics, though. And Pat also has been a volunteer assisting the Friends of Cody with it's book sales.

n conjunction with the SAPL Adult Sum-Reads," the Igo Library Seniors Group, the Elderberries, is hosting a series of six workshops during Summer 2013, entitled "Groundbreaking Memoirs."

The first memoir writing workshop was held on June 18. Deb Rankin, Director of the Northwest Vista College Writing Lab, helped the attendees begin to think about their life experiences and which memories they might want to turn into memoirs. Several exercises, including mapping one's neighborhood or a special place in one's life, resulted in many fascinating stories. In July, August, and September, another series of advanced memoir-writing workshops will be conducted by the UTSA San Antonio Writing Project. 


