Friends of the San Antonio Public Library Board Meeting

The Friends of the San Antonio Public Library met at the Central Library on January 19, 2014. President **Linda Arronge** called the meeting to order at 2:02 p.m. The roll call of members of the Board was read by the Secretary, and a quorum was declared.

Board Members present were: Linda Arronge, Robert Mason, Beverly Duran, Pat Peak, Nancy Gandara, Arline Braswell, Shirley Coleman, Antoinette Franklin, Jackie Fremming, Bruce Gill, Beth Graham, Delores Huber, Yolanda Fitzpatrick, Aaron Konstam, Pat Konstam, Karen Matson, Pat Mendiola, Larry Purkey, Liz Purkey, Ann Springer, and Jill Zimmerman.

Approval of Minutes: Jackie Fremming moved that the minutes as published in the January-February 2014 SAPLings be approved. The motion was seconded. The minutes as published were approved by the Board.

President's Report: Linda Arronge reported that the Executive Board had approved bonuses for Monica Hernandez, Manager of the BookCellar, and for Alana Woods, Newsletter Editor, for their exemplary service in 2013. She also commended the Arts & Letters Committee, chaired by Bob Mason, for a great program, as well as the Executive Committee and Christie Smith who met to adopt requirements and protocol to select a new printer/distribution company for SAPL-ings since Southwest Research. Institute, who had provided the service for us in the past, would be unable to continue this operation.

Linda distributed a handout of Libraries scheduling voting

so Friends groups could plan Book Sales and meetings. Some upcoming events include:

- San Antonio Book Festival and Texas Library Association Conference (both in April); volunteers will be needed.
- The Arts & Letters Committee will begin planning in March for the 2014 Award Ceremony.
- The FOSAPL 50th Anniversary Committee has planned a City Council Proclamation Day event, date to be announced.
- The meeting location for the next Board meeting (March 16) will be at the Pruitt Library at Roosevelt High School on Walzem Rd.

Treasurer's Report: Beverly **Duran** provided a handout of the Treasurer's Report, which consisted of the Income and Expense Report and a list of account balances for all Branch and Support groups for the year ending December 31, 2013. FOSAPL income for the year was \$96,077.50. Our assets, including the BookCellar, total \$104,352.97. We will make a donation this year to San Antonio Public Library of \$55,000; that is, \$50,000 from FOSAPL income and \$5,000 from a donation designated to the Library. The Board will review later in the year to see if we can provide the Library with additional funds as cuts in the City budget are anticipated. The Treasurer's Report will be filed for audit.

Featured Speaker: Linda introduced the speaker for the annual meeting, Ramiro Salazar, Director of the San Antonio Public Library. His topic was "State of the San Antonio Public Library."

Mr. Salazar thanked the Friends for their generous donation as well as their advocacy for the Library. Library advocates will be one of our greatest resources in the coming year.

Some information shared by Director Salazar included:

- The new library building in District 2 is underway with photos and floor plans available.
- In District 9, the purchase of a standing building for renovation will move the plans for that library along at a faster pace. A survey of potential library users indicated a desire for more books, rather than fewer books and more electronic materials.
- The new project at the Central Library is Connection Central with 100 computer stations for training plus the use of mobile devices, as well as kiosks for digital library services.
- A stimulus grant provided funds for Branch library upgrades.
- A grant from Valero Corporation for outreach services to "Promise Neighborhoods" will provide literacy and other programs, particularly on the east side.
- Several library buildings have received maintenance upgrades for windows, doors, electrical systems, air conditioning, and even roof repair through efforts by the Library Foundation and the City.
- Brook Hollow, Forest Hills, Guerra, Johnston, and Thousand Oaks have all been the beneficiaries of these updates. Several other library locations will be added during the year.
- Also at Central, in partnership with the Mayor's office, Café Commerce will concentrate

on developing resources for small businesses and entrepreneurs.

- The Central Library will be 20 years old in 2015. A Gala is planned as well as renovations and improvements with the help of the Library Foundation. We will be seeking funding for technology from technology firms in the area.
- Filtering equipment will be required by law on all Library computers in 2014.
- Enhancement of the library website to provide payment of fines and fees on line is projected for 2014.
- Director Salazar also spoke about the anticipated challenge of the Fiscal 2014-15 City Budget, which will need all the advocacy the Friends can provide. Our Texana/ Genealogy collection will have to find a new model to provide services. There are some difficult choices ahead regarding library staff, hours and services so that we can continue to provide historical and genealogy research services to library users.

At this point, there was approximately a 25-minute delay to respond to a fire alarm.

On return, Mr. Salazar responded to questions covering some of the points he had discussed.

Liaison Reports: Jean Brady, Library Board President, speaking for the Library Trustees, applauded the financial status of the Friends of SAPL. When it comes to the City Budget, everything will be a priority, and Jean stressed the need for Friends members to attend meetings and speak out when the Budget meetings are held throughout the City. Two City Council Districts will be electing new Council persons. Jean suggests researching their attitudes toward Library funding and letting them know of your advocacy.

Committee Reports:

BookCellar Committee: Tom Nemeth reported two very productive Saturday sales, about \$500 each.

The San Antonio Express-News donated about 60 books to the BookCellar for resale. All forms of social media are in use to promote sales, including, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. The Treasurer's Report shows the total BookCellar income (after taxes) to be \$76,115.05 in 2013.

Membership: Christie **Smith** provided a PowerPoint presentation to explain the Membership report in detail. 2013 Memberships totaled 979, just short of the 1000 goal. January-February 2014 Newsletters were sent to ALL members, even those who didn't request paper copies to be sure everyone was reminded about the Annual meeting. Members who receive online copies are urged to read your email as statistics show only about 40% of members opened their email in a recent mailout. If you have a change of street address or email address. please be sure to notify the Membership Secretary. The Post Office will not forward SAPLings even if you have provided a forwarding address, and they charge us for returned mail. The Membership renewal envelope now has a block to check for those interested in assisting with various Friends activities, and you can also use the envelope to request a membership card if you wish to have one. The membership directory will soon be available online. Christie advised the Board she had tendered her resignation as Membership Secretary to President Linda

Arronge and following her report, Linda presented Christie with a Certificate of Appreciation for the many hours Christie has spent analyzing membership data to increase membership and member participation and to provide the membership with up-to-date information.

Christie introduced **Linda**Cheatum as the newly appointed Membership Secretary. Linda has been active in the Friends group at Great

Nominating Committee Report: Nancy Gandara, Cochair, thanked the Nominating Committee members, Arline Braswell, Co-Chairman; Shirley Coleman, Jackie Fremming, Bob Mason, Karen Matson, and Pat Mendiola. Nancy noted that Arline Braswell, Antoinette Franklin, Yolanda Fitzpatrick, and Jill Zimmerman have agreed to stay on the Board for an additional term. Arline introduced the nominees who have accepted the Committee's nomination to serve on the 2014-2016 Board: Rita Corey, Jose Duran, Beverly Harris, Marshall Mundorf, and Rowena Rodgers. The thirteen Board members who are in the middle of their term (with one year remaining) were also introduced.

President Arronge asked for a motion concerning the election of new Board members for 2014-2016 and asked if there were any additional nominees to the slate presented by the Nominating Committee.

Arline Braswell asked to be recognized to nominate an additional candidate to the Board, Mary McAfee. Rowena Rogers seconded. The motion carried, and all nominees were elected.

Adjournment: Since there was no additional business to be considered, the President thanked the Memorial Friends for providing the refreshments for today and adjourned the meeting.

Benefits of Table Tennis

While the table tennis tables have brought about hours of fun and enjoyment to the Mission Library patrons, did you know that there are tremendous health benefits that go along with all this merriment?

According to a Good Morning America report that first aired in 2011, scientists have crowned table tennis as "the #1 Brain Sport." Dr. Wendy Suzuki, professor of neuroscience and psychology at New York University, states that there are three major areas affected by this game. The fine motor control and exquisite handeve coordination involved with dodging and diving for the ball engages and enhances the primary motor cortex and cerebellum—areas responsible for arm and hand movement. Secondly, by anticipating an opponent's shot, a player uses the prefrontal cortex for strategic planning. Lastly, the aerobic exercise from the physical activity of the game stimulates the hippocampus, the part of the brain that is responsible for allowing us to form and retain long-term facts and events.

And in addition to all that brain exercise, a 2006 report in the *Los Angeles Times* says that a 150-pound person can burn 272 calories by playing table tennis for an hour. Considering the fact that the sport is entertaining and addictive, it can be a fun and easy way to burn calories.





San Antonio Book Festival

April 5, 2014 10:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.

Saturday, April 5, 2014, is set to be "one for the books" as the Library Foundation presents its second annual San Antonio Book Festival. This all-day, free event is held downtown at the Central Library, Southwest School of Art, and the Empire



Theater, where book lovers of all ages and interests have a chance to get up close to their favorite authors at engaging readings, panel discussions, sales, and signings. There are topics for everyone, from politics and fiction to poetry and cookbooks. The lineup of 70 authors showcases acclaimed national and regional writers who reflect the best books that American publishers are currently offering, while local talent adds a unique sense of place and reflects South Texas' rich cultural heritage.

The San Antonio Book Festival makes the literary world more accessible to all of San Antonio. More than 4,000 people visited the first festival, and we expect to double that in 2014.

Adults, families and students from all areas of the city take part while partnerships with community groups and SABF's educational outreach also encourage attendance. In addition to the author programming, there is plenty of entertainment: Food trucks offer a variety of eats, special tents feature live music, recipe demonstrations by cookbook authors and a new Wi-Fi technology area. For families and younger festival-goers, there are interactive bilingual areas with story time, art projects and learning activities. Small presses and non-profit organizations focused on literacy, culture and education promote their wares and work at booths in the Exhibitor Tent.

The festival's location at the library builds awareness and excitement for the citywide system and the resources libraries offer. The downtown venue also helps to develop a more magnetic, vibrant and creative urban core. With its special focus on authors, ideas and imagination, the Book Festival positions San Antonio as a focal point for the literary arts.



To encourage regular customers to visit the store more often, manager **Monica Hernandez** is sending photos and frequent messages on social media about special deals and newly arrived books and media. To receive those messages, you can follow the BookCellar on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, or Google+.

Special deals this month include an 8-day Spring Break Sale on Sunday, March 9, through Sunday, March 16, during regular store hours. It will feature marked-downed prices on topics such as crafts, gardening, decorating, home improvement, health, and fitness, plus 10-cent books for children.

Throughout March, the buyone-get-one special will be all regular priced books for adults and children in the 300 Dewey Decimal series. The 300s range from politics to folklore and money management to true crime.

April specials will be a series of pop-up sales in which seasonal or overstocked books in particular categories will be marked down for a limited time. Dates and topics will be announced on social media and the store's email list.



Recent book donations from private or corporate donors included hundreds of new books that the *San Antonio Express-News* received from publishers as review copies and then passed on to the BookCellar. Both fiction and nonfiction were included. Other recent arrivals include large quantities of audio books withdrawn from libraries.

The BookCellar will be open extended hours from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, April 5, during the San Antonio Book Festival at Central Library and Southwest School of Art. The initial festival last year brought a lot of visitors and extra business to the store.

A reminder to branch book sale volunteers: If you have attractive, saleable books left over from sales and carts, the BookCellar might take them. If active BookCellar volunteers are working at your sale, they can choose leftovers the store might be able to sell. Otherwise, the BookCellar Committee's policy requires you to call manager Monica Hernandez to see if she wants the books and only then to deliver the books to the store. This is because the store has limited space for storage and for Freebies. The Committee invites you to come to the store and pick up boxes of duplicates to put in your sales – but please don't bring them back.





Getting to Know Your Friends – Bruce Gill

B ruce Gill walked into the restaurant looking very dapper with the same friendly smile he greets us with every Thursday at the Book Cellar.

Bruce was born and reared in San Antonio, and graduated from Jefferson High School in 1957. He attended San Antonio College (SAC), The University of Texas at Austin, and received a B.A. in Public Administration from Our Lady of the Lake University. Bruce met his late wife, Carmen, at SAC, and they married in 1962. Carmen was a teacher who passed away in October, 2012. They had two children, Shannon and Brian. Brian lives in New York City, and Shannon lives here in San Antonio. He also has one grandson, Joshua, whom he enjoys spending as much time with as possible.

Starting In 1961, Bruce worked for the State Department of Public Welfare as a Case Worker before accepting a position with HUD in Ft. Worth as an Urban Intern. During the next four years, he assisted cities in Arkansas and Louisiana with the Urban Renewal program and other urban improvement programs of HUD. Upon the opening of a HUD field office, Bruce and his family returned to San Antonio in 1970. During his career with HUD, Bruce held four important positions including Urban Renewal Representative, Community Services Advisor, Housing Management Officer, and Multifamily Housing Representative. His final position prior to retiring in 1994 included interfacing with both the public and private sectors in the development of FHA-insured multifamily and public housing projects.

Subsequent to his retirement, Bruce moved to Round Rock, Texas, where he became the executive director of the Round Rock Housing Authority for the next seven years.

However, with the pending birth of his grandson in San Antonio, he and Carmen moved back to this city in 2001.

After his final retirement, Bruce was looking for volunteer opportunities, and a friend from Jefferson High School, our own **Jim Wogstad**, suggested he consider working at the BookCellar. Bruce took the suggestion and has been a loyal Cellar volunteer since 2005. He has served on the BookCellar Committee and as Vice President of FOSAPL where he remains as a Board member.

Bruce has a long list of accomplishments and never misses a chance to serve the community when he sees a need. He currently mentors at Larkspur Elementary in the Northeast ISD, and he has recently begun driving for Meals on Wheels. He also belongs to the Descendants of Stephen F. Austin's "Old 300" and the State Association of Texas Pioneers, both of which provide educational opportunities and scholarship



monies to history educators in private and public schools.

Bruce is on the Outreach Committee at St. Thomas Episcopal Church, which has recently "adopted" the Santa Fe Episcopal Church on the south side of the city. Starting with the donation of 300 children's books from Carmen's collection, this committee is assisting Santa Fe to establish a mini-library for the youth in the local neighborhood to use and enjoy. Bruce and other committee members also serve dinner to residents of Haven for Hope one evening each month.

Bruce, here's to a job well done. Kudos for all of your time and dedication to making life a little easier for the people served by each of the organizations who are lucky enough to have you on their team.
