# Friends of the San Antonio Public Library **Board Meeting**

Sunday, November 15, 2015 Submitted by Nancy Gandara, Secretary

The Board of the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library met on Sunday, November 15, 2015, at the Encino Branch Library. Vice-President Robert Mason called the meeting to order at 2:30 p.m. Secretary Nancy Gandara called the roll, and declared that a quorum was present.

Board members present were: Robert Mason, Nancy Gandara, Linda Arronge, Arline Braswell, Rita Corey, Jose Duran, Antoinette Franklin, Bev Golden, Beth Graham, Beverly Harris, Pat Konstam, Mary McAfee, Pat Mendiola, Pat Peak, Ronnie Retzloff, Rowena Rodgers, Stephanie Serrata, Christie Smith, Delia Trimble, and Jill Zimmerman.

Approval of Minutes: It was moved and seconded to accept the Minutes of the meeting of Sept. 20, 2015, as printed in the Nov/Dec 2015 issue of **SAP-Lings** and the motion passed unanimously.

President's Report: Although Karen Matson had been taken ill and could not attend the meeting, she had given Vice President Robert Mason notes of some of her activities over the past two months, which he presented. Robert also recognized the presence of former FOSAPL President and current Vice President of the Board of Trustees Linda Naim in the audience.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Bev Duran presented the Treasurer's Report of Oct. 31, 2015. As of Oct. 31, FOSAPL had total assets of \$222,556.98, of which \$112,621.77 was designated for branch groups, and checks in the amount of \$1,816.74 were outstanding. It was noted that recent book sales

at the branch libraries had been quite lucrative.

Membership Secretary's Report: Linda Cheatum reported that 298 people had paid their 2016 dues, of which 210 are new members. Newsletters are sent electronically to 55 honorary members. Currently, the total number of Friends (for both 2015 and 2016) exceeds 1,000.

#### **LIAISON REPORTS**

Library Administration Liaison: Ramiro Salazar, Library Director, reported the result of recent elections held by the Trustees: Paul Stahl, Chair; Linda Naim, Vice Chair; Loyce Ince, Secretary; and Judy Cruz, Treasurer. The City Council approved a budget amendment that provided \$40,000 to have shade structures erected for the playgrounds at the Carver Branch Library and Lions Field. An additional \$150,000 was designated to create a Field Office for District 7 at the Maverick Branch Library. The Library and the Library Foundation are partnering in the relocation of the Latino Collection (from the sixth floor to the first floor of the Central Library), and donors who contribute \$1,000 or more will be recognized on a "donor wall."

**BookCellar:** Richard Morales reported that the BookCellar Manager Marina Rhodes, started work on Oct. 26 and reminded the Friends to come and shop during late-November's "50% off' sale.

FOSAPL operating budget for
2016, which would be presented for consideration during
New Business. Members of this
Task Force were: Bev Duran,

Nominating Committee:
Delia Trimble reported that members of the Nominating Committee (Vera Banner, Shirley Coleman, Nancy Gandara, Eddie Patino, and Delia Trimble) met to assign contacts to be made of current, former, and potential board members. Those who are eligible and wish to be on the FOSAPL board for the 2016—2018 term will stand for election at the Annual Meeting, January 10, 2016.

FOSAPL Board will only be asked to consider proposing changes to two (2) bylaws under New Business at this meeting. Jose explained the context of the changes, which are: in Art.VI, drop the phrase "and qualified;" and in Art. X add the words "regular or special." These will be addressed at length in the next newsletter.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

Celebration of the "Next 50 Years": Christie Smith reported that the celebratory luncheon held earlier today was well-attended and enjoyable, and served as a great kick-off to the Friends' future.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

Ratify action taken on October 24 based on an electronic vote of the FOSAPL Board, which authorized hiring Marina Rhodes as the Book-Cellar Manager. The motion was made and seconded; the motion carried.

Consider approval of the BookCellar "Policies & Procedures" document (approved by the BookCellar Committee on July 16) Pat Konstam moved that the item be postponed until the Jan. 10, 2016, meeting, in order for the BookCellar Committee to discuss potential changes to the document. Stephanie Serrata seconded it. The question was called, and the motion to postpone passed.

Consider approval of the BookCellar manager job description document (amended by the BookCellar Committee on October 22). Pat Konstam made the motion, and Rowena Rodgers seconded it; the motion carried.

Consider approval of the bylaws of the Friends of the San Pedro Branch Library.
Lori Gonzalez, the President of the Friends of the San Pedro

Branch Library, was introduced and welcomed. The motion to approve the bylaws was made by **Delia Trimble**, seconded by **Jill Zimmerman**, and carried.

Consider authorization of a bonus in the amount of \$100 for Alana Woods, SAPLings editor and webmaster for friendsofsapl.org. Delia Trimble made the motion, which was seconded by Beth Graham. During the ensuing discussion, it was recommended that there be criteria for receipt of bonuses in the future. The motion to authorize the bonus of \$100 carried.

Authorize an Operating Budget for FOSAPL for 2016. Bev Duran made the motion, which was seconded by Mary McAfee. Bev Duran explained some of the line item expenditures and pointed out that a "balanced" budget was being proposed: \$90,500 in anticipated income from all sources, and \$90,400 in total budget expenses, of which \$55,000 was identified as the contribution to SAPL for public programming and staff development. After a brief discussion, the motion passed.

Authorize presentation of proposed revisions to FOSAPL bylaws at Annual Meeting. Jose Duran made the motion that the two changes previously explained be proposed for action by the general membership at the Annual Meeting, and Mary McAfee seconded the motion. The motion carried.

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

Following announcements of future book sale dates and members' news, Vice President **Robert Mason** adjourned the meeting.

#### **Brook Hollow**

The Brook Hollow Friends met on Nov. 7 to discuss the results of the successful October book sale and to distribute proposed revisions to the Brook Hollow Friends' bylaws. Branch Manager Charity Gallardo reported on the purchases that had been approved during the last meeting and presented the staff's requests for funding related to specific items as well as funding for future programs.

During a meeting held on Dec. 5, the following individuals were elected to serve as officers through Dec. 2017: President **Pat Finley**, Vice President **Sue Bowser**, Secretary **Veronica Rouse**, and Treasurer **Neal Bjornson**.

The proposed bylaws were discussed and approved by those in attendance, and they will be presented to the FOSAPL Board at their meeting in Jan. 2016. Pat Bjornson provided a list of activities for which volunteers were being sought. Veronica Rouse volunteered to serve as Chairperson of the Staff Appreciation Dinner (tentatively scheduled for the spring of 2016), Gwen McLeod offered to serve as the Social Chairman, Becky Benesh volunteered to serve as Historian and maintain the Branch's scrapbook, and Ronnie Retzloff offered to serve as the Membership Chairman. There are other activities for which volunteers are needed. including book sales and the semi-annual Brook Hollow newsletter. Members are encouraged to volunteer for these or any other activities that interest them.

Manager Charity Gallardo described the Teddy Bear Sleepover, funded by the Friends and hosted by the library staff in November. Children delivered their teddy bears or other stuffed animals to the Library on Nov. 19 for a sleepover. Charity presented a slide show featuring highlights of the activities the animals participated in, including eating pizza, riding in cardboard cars, and generally having a good time. The animals returned home the next day, with photos (taken by library staff) for their mommies and daddies (View the slide show on friendsofsapl.org.).

The Brook Hollow Friends recently received a sizable donation of vinyl LPs – popular, classical, rock, etc., from the 1940s through the 1970s. They're being sold for \$1 each. If you're interested, contact **Pat Bjornson** at 210-497-3279 for additional information; these LPs may not last long.

# SAPL Hosts Transformational Art Exhibit


The San Antonio Public Library announced the public opening of a world class exhibit by an innovative artist at the Central Library Gallery in December.

# FOSAPL Board Proposes Changes to Bylaws

On Nov. 15, 2015, the Board of Directors voted to request the general membership to consider taking action to make the following two changes to our bylaws, at the Annual Meeting of Jan. 10, 2016:

— Article VI. Officers, Elections, Duties and Powers, Section 3: In the sentence that currently reads "Officers elected at the annual meeting shall immediately take office and hold same for two (2) years and until their successors are elected and qualified . . . . ", the recommendation is that the phrase "and qualified" be dropped. Since no "qualifications" or "qualifying" processes are described anywhere in the bylaws or standing rules, this phrase ("and qualified") is meaningless.

— Article X. Amendments, Section 2:
The recommendation is to add the phrase "regular or special" to the sentence, so that it would read, "These bylaws may be amended or new bylaws adopted at any annual, regular or special meeting of the members of this corporation in accordance with the following procedures and conditions:..." During discussion, a case was made that the process for amending the bylaws would not be changed by adding these new opportunities for amending or adding to them, and that this change would allow more attention to the revisions that may be proposed, in the future.

### **Interview with John Doe**

Back in May I was walking into Central, my hands loaded with a bag of sausage biscuits and small coffees from McDonald's. As I was waiting for the main doors to open, an elderly man approached me and asked if I'd be willing to trade whatever I had in the bag for a newspaper he had stolen from the nearby Valero. I told him that I wasn't interested in a "trade" but that I'd give him a biscuit and a cup of coffee. I handed over the items and left to go work my shift in the BookCellar. The same thing happened the following weekend, and we soon developed a pattern that led to me learning little bits about him at each meeting. He's been in the BookCellar a few times to rummage through our freebies. One weekend, he asked me what he needed to do to volunteer in the BookCellar, and I explained that it was as easy as filling out the form and paying the annual dues. Not long after that, he turned in his unsealed form along with his dues. When I finally looked at the envelope, I realized that he listed himself as "John Doe." There was no address or branch selection. I haven't seen him since September, and I still look for him every time I'm at Central. All I know about him is that he has no family in San Antonio, and he had a son who was stabbed to death at a friend's birthday party. I did try to persuade him to let me help him contact a few organizations that could help him with shelter

and food, but he never seemed interested and I wasn't going to push the issue

My acquaintance with this gentleman hit me in a way that I was not prepared for. I figured he had to be about my father's age (75 or 76), and every time I saw him I found myself wondering what I would do if my father needed help, and I was unable to provide it, even in the smallest way. John made me realize that I'm very fortunate. He also made me realize that I'm quick to judge people and situations of which I have no real understanding. It's one of the things I dislike about myself. John Doe shared some difficult and hurtful things about his past, and I shared almost nothing about my personal life. Perhaps sharing food with him from time to time was a defense mechanism which allowed me to give something back while keeping my distance at the same time. I have no answers and probably never will. I also wonder about why he joined the "Friends." I don't think he had a genuine interest in volunteering at the BookCellar, and I doubt seriously he was looking for any kind of recognition. What I am certain of is that he is a "Friend" of the library, and I held in my hand the envelope that proves it.

So ... did I ask John Doe if I could interview him? The answer to that questions is, "yes and no." Yes, I did ask the question and he did say, "yes." He said that I could share his brief story, but that it would

only be a comment on a dull and unremarkable life. I've never had anyone say that to me before. Did I get his final review and approval? No, I did not.

Normally, I send my finished column to my subject for any revisions, but that didn't happen in this case. I guess I'll just tell myself that John Doe would have been happy with the finished product.

To the readers: Granted, this is not my typical "Getting to know your friends" column. While I love and appreciate the fact that I'm given the opportunity to share with you the lives of very intelligent and educated people, I know that I'm not always going to hear beautiful stories with happy endings. I believe that only happens in a perfect world. After all, how can we all have wonderful and amazing stories? If John Doe's story taught me anything, it was that.


