Dear Friends,

Congratulations to all who made this year's Big Book Sale such a success: special thanks to Aaron and Pat Konstam, Monica Hernandez, members of the Book Cellar Committee, and volunteers (including those of Valero Energy) — and all of you Friends who shopped! Preview Party shoppers came from as far away as Mexico and departed with boxes of bargain goodies.

In the past few years, the Book Cellar's sales have provided the funds that the Friends contribute to the San Antonio Public Library for the Summer Reading Program and for year-round staff development. But while our donation may "fill the holes," without support from the City Council, there will be painful cuts to the Library's budget for 2009—2010. The reductions will result in fewer materials being purchased, service hours being cut, or branches being closed.

The "Today Show" recently ran a story about how people are using their public libraries during this hard economy: more people are using library internet-access computers to find jobs, résumé-writing classes and computer-use classes, children's programs, DVD's and CD's, etc.—which just goes to prove that American Library Association saying, "Libraries will get you through times of no money better than money will get you through times of no libraries!"

But it's not enough to have a catchy saying or even polls that *prove* that "San Antonio Loves Its Libraries" when the City budget is cut. It takes each of us to speak up for literacy, lifelong learning, and the economic value of the Library. Contact your Councilperson **now** to express the importance of our Library to the daily life of you and your family, and to the economic health of our city. Personal anecdotes mean a lot, so don't be shy!

Finally, "Good job!" to **Jean Brady**, a Friend and currently the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the SAPL, as she has been honored by the national Urban Libraries Council for her efforts to promote the library to both local government leaders and the community.

And don't forget to make time to read (or listen to an audio book from the San Antonio Public Library) during the lazy days (?) of Summer

Friends of the San Antonio Public Library Board Meeting

May 18, 2009

President Nancy Gandara called the meeting to order at 2:05. Present were Nancy Gandara, Bruce Gill, Linda Arronge, Judy Wilson, Evelyn Bonavita, Shirley Coleman, Shirley Davis, Jackie Fremming, Dolores Huber, Claudia Kohler, Robert La-Caff, Mary McAfee, Josie Martinez, Pat Mendiola, Ann Tobin, and Lyn Belisle. Yolanda Kilpatrick from the Forest Hills Friends group welcomed the members.

The minutes were printed in the *SAPLings*. After a correction about the amount donated to Maverick Library—it was \$2,000 instead of \$200—the minutes were approved as amended.

President's Report. Nancy Gandara attended the Library Board meetings in April and May 2009. She reported that *The Java Nook* finally opened outside the Central Library. Gandara also attended the Library Champions Awards.

Treasurer's Report. Judy Wilson reported she received \$40 from Rick Kelsey as a donation. She also reported that she bought \$100 worth of stamps because the price of stamps was going up. The report will be filed for audit.

Library Board Report.
Board President Jean Brady
was unable to attend the meeting because it conflicted with
this year's annual Young
Pegasus Awards.

Library Administration.

Aubey George reported that he attended the "B" session of the City Council. This meeting starts the Budget cycle.

Two new branch libraries are going to have public meetings. The Stone Oak meeting will be Tuesday, May 19, at

Wilderness Oak Elementary. The Mission Library will meet at Gilbert Elementary on Wednesday, May 20, at 6:30.

Memorial Library is putting in shelves that were approved on the last Bond 2007.

The Roosevelt Library will not open until October 2009 to save money.

Also, some of the libraries are sharing managers to save money, and we do not know how long sharing managers will continue.

Foundation. Sarah Swinney was unable to attend but sent the following memo in her absence:

The Foundation was notified that the National Endowment of the Arts will provide a grant for The Big Read in 2010. This will be the third year. The SAPL staff voted on the title, and the winner was *Bless Me Ultima*. **Sarah Michelle Ricondo** and **Diana Starett** will attend the orientation in Minneapolis in June.

The Library's 25th Anniversary Celebration of *The House on Mango Street* was a wonderful success.

The Foundation will complete its pilot project with Scholastic Caravan in May 2009. The first seven months were a tremendous success. The proposal for next year is currently wrapping up.

Committee Reports

Book Cellar–Presented by **Anne Long.** The sale will be Friday, June 19, through Sunday, June 21, with a Preview Sale Thursday, June 18, from 4–7. for Friends of the Library members. Branch libraries who wish to pick up books may do so on Monday, June 22, between 10 and 3.

Membership. Claudia Kohler reported that no memorials were received. The current paid memberships stand at 772.

Newsletter. It was reported that 677 newsletters were mailed out. **Mary McAfee** said that 75 newsletters were delivered to the Book Cellar.

Old Business

Bruce Gill reported that the Audit was complete. The committee (Robbi Rupert, Bruce Gill, Pat Peak, and Judy Wilson) had these recommendations:

Require the Book Cellar manager to send the original daily receipt log to the treasurer by the end of the 3rd of each month

Require verification of the bank statements by two members of the Executive Board Consider having quarterly tax reports done by the Treasurer for the Book Cellar manager's withholdings.

Arts and Letters. Linda Arronge reported that the SAPLings contained notice that we are accepting nominations for the Arts and Letters Awards until July 1. The nominees should contribute to the Arts and Letters by their talent or ability to encourage others.

New Business

Nancy Gandara reported the program will be on Saturday, July 18, at the Central Library. The members discussed and agreed to allocate \$400 for refreshments and parking. Ann

Tobin said she would try to get the refreshments donated.

just getting started, the library offers beginning readers and early chapter books. The children's collection at the library includes over 650,000 books.

Use a computer—The library has 35 public access computers at the Central Library, and over 350 available system-wide. Students can use the internet for research, practice math and reading skills with computer games, or type up papers and school projects. Bring a disk or flash drive if you need to save your work.

Get answers—Need help with a homework assignment? At <u>mysapl.org</u> the Library has posted a Homework Guide to help you search our catalog, review databases, and even take a look at our favorite resources—all in one place. Find and use this information from your home computer or visit the Library—every Library location offers free wireless access and computers for public use. Here are a few highlights of the Library's homework resources. Just click the "databases" link on the mysapl.org home page to find these helpful aids and more, and if you need help locating and using these or other materials check with your local librarian or call 207-2500.

• Tutor.com—Free online tutoring in math, science, social studies, and English

for grades 4–12 and College Intro. Available every day 3 –10; *en español* Sunday through Thursday 3–9.

- <u>Searchasaurus</u>—Complete with erupting volcanoes, dinosaur guide and compass, Searchasaurus is an exciting and easy way for young researchers to experience online searching.
- <u>Kids Search</u>—Kids Search is designed especially for youth in grades K-8 and serves as an interface for searching across multiple databases.
- <u>Biography Resource Center</u>—This database integrates biographies with related full-text articles

- from hundreds of periodicals, as well as tens of thousands of images and links to hand-picked web sites.
- LearningExpress— Preparing for an advanced placement test or the SATs this year? LearningExpress offers interactive, online practice tests for these and many other exams. You can get immediate scoring, complete answer explanations, and an analysis of your results. In addition to the practice tests, there are online tutorial courses to help you improve your reading, writing, and other academic skills.

Book Cellar News



he Big Summer Sale in June brought in just over \$8,000, making in one fast-paced weekend what the Book Cellar takes in during seven weeks of daily sales. The sale took a tremendous amount of work, which was provided by 52 volunteers from the Friends plus 35 people from Valero Energy Corp. As an additional benefit for FOSAPL, 27 new members signed up in order to attend the members-only preview sale.

St. Philip's College gave the Book Cellar 1,000 boxes of books withdrawn from its library just before the Summer Sale, greatly expanding the sale inventory and making a large number of scholarly and technical books available to the public at low cost. We thank the college for its contribution to the work of Friends of the Library.

One task of the Book Cellar Committee during the past seven months has been developing a concise mission statement for the Book Cellar and an updated summary of committee policies. The resulting mission statement says: "The Book Cellar, operated by Friends of the San Antonio Public Library volunteers, makes available to the public books and media withdrawn from the Library or given by donors. The Book Cellar sells these materials at affordable prices and uses the money to subsidize Library programs." The policy statement is scheduled to be presented to the FOSAPL Board at its July 19 meeting.

The annual Volunteer Appreciation Potluck Supper and Apron Award Cere-



mony is scheduled for Monday, July 27, from 4–6 p.m. in the Book Cellar. All Book Cellar volunteers and spouses are invited and asked to bring food to share.

Two-for-the-price-of-one specials in July and August are depending on what's left after cleanup from the big sale. Call the Book Cellar at (210) 227-9519 to see what they are.

ocal author and San Antonio Independent School District teacher **Veronica Goldbach** will host a Teen Writers Workshop on August 22 at 12:00 noon at the Central Library for teens interested in learning about writing and getting published. Goldbach released her first book, a young-adult novel called *Deep in the Heart of High School*, in May. Goldbach describes her book as *Sisterhood of the Traveling Pants* meets marching band in Texas. Written with verve and touches of humor, the voices in this first novel ring with authenticity. A Kirkus review calls it "enjoyable and notable for its Texas milieu." Teens are invited to meet Goldbach at a book signing party after the workshop at 2:00 p.m. at Teen Services.

Goldbach grew up in San Antonio, Texas, and went to school less than five minutes away from the Alamo. After receiving a B.A. in humanities and an M.A. in teaching middle grades from Trinity University, she became a public school teacher. She has taught English as a second language at inner-city middle and elementary schools in Los Angeles, California, and currently in San Antonio, where she now lives. Veronica became interested in writing young adult fiction while trying to find novels that her seventh-grade students could relate to and also enjoy. She is currently teaching future writers in San Antonio, and this book marks her debut.

San Antonio Trustee Jean Brady Named 2009 ULC Urban Player

Award honors Brady's role in elevating awareness of the Library's contributions to its City

May 5, 2009 (CHICAGO) - San Antonio Public Library Board Chair Jean Brady is the first trustee ever to receive the Urban Libraries Council (ULC) Urban Player Award. She's being honored at ULC's annual membership meeting for her role in earning greater recognition of the San Antonio Public Library on a decision-making level within its city and the resulting consolidated effort to create a sustainable funding base. The Urban Player Award is presented each year to the individual who most profoundly demonstrates library and community leadership. Ms. Brady will collect a prize of \$1,000.

"Jean's community leadership skills made the San Antonio Public Library not only relevant, but also critical to the lives of San Antonians," said Eva Poole, Director of Libraries, Denton (TX) Public Library and Chair of the 2009 Urban Player Award Selection Committee.

"Since her election to the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the San Antonio Public Library, Jean has dedicated her time and energy to raising the Library's profile with community decisionmakers. More than just an advocate, she has demonstrated leadership throughout her term of office, developing and implementing strategies to effectively present the Library's case to both the government and the community at large," said San Antonio **Public Library Director** Ramiro Salazar. "We are delighted to see her leadership recognized with this award from the Urban Libraries Council."

Elected board chair in 2006, Ms. Brady was inspired by a number of events that showed little consideration for the Library's needs relative to other city departments. She formed a Library Advocacy Committee that lobbied council members and directed outreach efforts, as well as a speakers' bureau to make presentations about the Library to civic organizations and community groups. Further, she was pivotal in finding platforms to communicate the Library's role in a variety of civic and community quality of life issues. The result was the development of widespread support of the Library and understanding of its contributions. In fact, a subsequent community poll showed that more than 90% of those surveyed considered the Library a good use of public funding and that nearly three-quarters would support designating sales tax revenues to generate funding for the library. These results were announced at a news conference in February 2009, at which time Ms. Brady called for the Library to be included in a referendum to designate one-eighth cent of the city sales tax for Library funding.

"Jean's work is a clear demonstration of the pivotal role trustees can play in bringing the library to the community table," said **Patrick Losinski**, Director of the Columbus Metropolitan Library and Chair of the ULC Executive Board. "She's built an important model for partnership among libraries, their boards and their communities."

Past winners of the ULC Urban Player Award include **Sam Morrison**, Director of the Broward County Public Library; Carlton Sears, Director of Public Library of Youngstown and Mahoning County; Lynn Lockwood, Baltimore County Public Library; Fontayne Holmes, Director of the Los Angeles Public Library; and, Jo Bryant, Director of the Toronto Public Library. 
