Birthdays! Come to help celebrate the Grand Openings of the Mission Branch April 30, and the Parman Branch on May 7. See the latest innovations in architecture for libraries, coupled with features that relate to each library's terrain and community.

Then plan to join the Friends of the Memorial Branch (known as the Amigos) in recognition of that branch's 30th "birthday" on May 21. This branch, located across from St. Mary's University, gets the prize for creative fundraising: more than \$2,200 was raised by renting parking spaces to revelers of the nearby Fiesta Oyster Bake this year!

But wait, there's more—the Friends of the Johnston Branch will blow out 30 candles on June 18, and will be joined by members of **Leah Carter Johnston's** family and winners of the Young Pegasus Poetry contests over the years. Ms. Carter originated this contest ("the longest -running poetry contest for children in the United States") in 1927, and many of the winners have grown up to be locally and nationally recognized in their careers. You can hear the authors of this year's entries read their winning poems on May 15 at Hermann Sons Lodge (515 S. St. Mary's St.)—then, years from now, you can say, "I knew them 'when'...".

And as the school year winds down and summer vacation begins, each of us should take a child, grandchild or young neighbor to participate in the summer Reading Program at their library—and ask a Children's Librarian to recommend some titles that kids of that age will like. As **Maya Angelou** observed, "Any book that helps a child to form a habit of reading, to make reading one of his deep and continuing needs, is good for him."

Just as we love to celebrate library birthdays, it is bittersweet to note that on May 29 the Bannwolf Library, which has operated as part of the Reagan High School since 1999 will cease providing services to the public (replaced by the new Parman Branch, in the Stone Oak area). "Thank you" to the staff who have provided such cheerful and creative programming, and to the school administrators who helped to make this partnership "work" so well!

Summer Reading Programs

A ll the San Antonio Public Libraries offer weekly programs for children during June and July.

Designed to emphasize the fun to be found in reading as well as the joy of self-directed discovery, library programs are free and open to the public.

Due to the potential for overcrowding, four of the branches use a ticketing system for weekly Kids Time programs: Cody, Igo, Parman and Semmes.

Children of all ages are welcome at library programs but there are suggested ages for each program to assure that all children from birth through the elementary grades can find a program that "fits" their abilities and interests.

The library does not offer reading instruction. However, studies indicate that children who read independently during the summer retain the reading skills they learned in school much better than children who don't read during the summer.

If you have questions about a specific program, please call the branch hosting that program. If you have a question about children's library programs in general, call the Central Children's Department at 210-207-2621.

We hope you and your friends will Dig Up Some Good Books this summer at the San Antonio Public Library.

Board Meeting March 20, 2011

The Friends of the San Antonio Public Library met on Sunday, March 20, 2011, in the meeting room at Carver Library. Those present were: Nancy Gandara, Linda Arronge, Judy Wilson, Anne Long, Shirley Coleman, Shirley Davis, Jackie Fremming, Bruce Gill, Pat Konstam, Robert LaCaff, Karen Matson, Mary McAfee, Bob Mason, Pat Mendiola, Ronnie Retzloff, Christie Smith and Ann Springer.

The Minutes of the January 16, 2011, meeting were printed in the March/April 2011 *SAP-Lings*. **Jackie Fremming** moved and **Mary McAfee** seconded the motion that the Minutes be accepted as they appeared in the Newsletter. The motion passed.

President's Report—Nancy Gandara gave a quick rundown of her many meetings with the Library Foundation, Library Trustees, Library Strategic Plan Committee and the BookCellar committee. A list of the dates, times and locations of the FOSAPL board meetings for the year have been emailed to all board members as well as a list of names, phone numbers, addresses and emails of the board members and directors.

Treasurer's Report—Judy Wilson outlined a few changes she has made to the layout of the Treasurer's Report form. The net assets for FOSAPL as of Feb. 28, 2011, equal \$47,138.09, and the Branch Group funds are \$111,874.56. A motion was made by Mary McAfee and seconded by Bob Mason that we accept the report. It passed and will be submitted for audit.

Library Board Report— Jean Brady reminded us of the exciting openings of the Mission Library on April 30 and the Parman Library on May 7. The Board is in the process of gathering input to create a master plan to spend grant money earmarked for Carver Library. Mission and Parman Libraries will share a \$100,000 gift from **Barry McKinny**.

Library Administration— Roberta Sparks reported that the Strategic Plan is in the middle stage of being developed. Staff work groups are focusing on specific areas to collect data and will make recommendations to the Library Board and the consultants about this project. There will also be public meetings to gain input from the community. Hiring for the new branches is going very well and there have been many promotions and transfers within the system. Many of those promoted are recipients of grant money given by the Institute of Museums and Library Services to allow people with a BA in Library Science to go for a Master's. Our good friend Kendra Tracta, who is now the Assistant Director, is moving to Washington in April. She will be greatly missed and very hard to replace. Another star in our crown is Jennifer Velasquez who has been named by The Library Journal as "A Mover and A Shaker" for

her work with Teens.

Library Foundation—In the absence of Carol Black, Nancy Gandara reported that Plains Capital Bank is making an offer to anyone who opens a personal checking account with a Debit Card at their Stone Oak Branch. The Foundation is moving seven trees selected for demolition to the Mission library location. Anyone interested may donate the cost of the transplant and have the tree dedicated to the donor.

SAPL Advocacy Committee—Linda Arronge (who has been a member of the Board's Advocacy Committee for several years) reported about opportunities for the Library to be included in elections for funding that are coming up in 2012: 1) the Mayor has indicated that he would like to add an eighthof-a-cent sales tax for education, and 2) discussions about Bond Issue projects have begun. If the Library would benefit from either of those funding sources, the Friends will be informed about the projects and will be asked to support the passage of either/both elections.

BookCellar-Aaron Konstam passed out printed book marks to be used by branches at book sales or other times when we could advertise the Book-Cellar. There are plenty more at the BookCellar. The Marketing Strategies Committee is in the process of collecting data to determine which books sell best and designing a customer survey. Aaron also remarked that the BookCellar is doing especially well considering major book stores are going out of business.

Membership—Nancy introduced our new membership chairperson, **Christie Smith**. Our membership as of March 16, 2011, is 750. Christie pointed out that of the 122 new members in 2010, 112 did not renew.

Library strategic plan on track

In February the San Antonio Public Library kicked off a strategic planning process to set the Library's goals and objectives for serving the community over the next five years.

With guidance from the Strategic Plan Leadership Advisory Committee chaired by **Tom Frost, Sr.**, and composed of leaders from fields such as education, health care, technology and transportation, six areas were selected for strategic focus: 1) supporting learning opportunities; 2) facilitating economic development; 3) fostering community connections; 4) improving public awareness and communication; 5) delineating the roles of Library support groups; and 6) improving organizational health.

A cadre of work groups has been meeting to develop strategies and action steps targeting each area of strategic focus. The next step is for the Strategic Plan task force, which consists of Library senior management, to use the proposed strategies and action steps to develop a consolidated draft plan, which will then be vetted by the Leadership Advisory Committee and the Library Board of Trustees. Once vetted, the plan will be shared with key Library stakeholders and the community for their input and suggestions. Based on that feedback, a final strategic plan will be developed.

Please stay tuned for further developments as we work to position the SAPL as a relevant and effective service organization for our community, now and in the future.

Summer Reading Club

Dig Up a Good Book! Excave un libro bueno!

Join the Mayor's Summer Reading Club at any San Antonio Public Library location or online beginning June 1.

As you read (or listen to) books this summer, list the titles you finish on your Summer Reading Log. Indicate what type of book each title is: Juvenile Fiction, Juvenile Nonfiction, Easy or Beginner.

If you read Juvenile Fiction and Nonfiction books, you must finish at least eight books to complete the Summer Reading Club.

If you read Easy and Beginner books, you must finish at least fifteen books to complete the Summer Reading Club.

If you read from both categories, you must finish at least twelve books to complete the Summer Reading Club.

When you have finished the correct number of books, bring your Reading Log back to the library to receive a Reading Club Certificate and to select a free paperback book to keep!

First day to submit your Reading Log: June 15. Last day to turn in your Log: August 31.


