Board Meeting

September 18, 2011

The Friends of the San Antonio Public Library met on Sunday, September 18, 2011, in the meeting room at the Thousand Oaks Branch Library. Board members present were: Nancy Gandara, Linda Arronge, Judy Wilson, Anne Long, Linda Nairn, Pat Bjornson, **Evelyn Bonavita**, Shirley Coleman, Jackie Fremming, Bruce Gill, Claudia Kohler, Yolanda Kirkpatrick, Mary McAfee, Josie Martinez, Pat Mendiola, Ronnie Retzloff, Robbi Rupert, Ann Springer, and Virginia Wong.

Jackie Fremming moved we accept the minutes of the July 17 meeting as printed in the *SAPLings*. **Ronnie Retzloff** seconded, and the motion passed.

President's Report—Nancy Gandara reviewed meetings that she had attended during the prior two months and highlighted her meeting with the Parman Friends group for orientation. She and administrative staff of SAPL met with the Landa branch group to discuss how funds raised by a Friends group fit into the library budget.

Treasurer's Report—Judy Wilson reported the net assets for FOSAPL as of August 31, 2011, as \$78,982.14. The Branch Group funds were \$93,713.48. Mary McAfee moved and Claudia Kohler seconded the motion to accept the Treasurer's Report, and the motion passed.

Library Board of Trustees
Report—Jean Brady reported
an increase in the City budget
to the Library of over three
million dollars. Among many
other things, these funds will
allow the Mollie Pruitt Branch
on Roosevelt to open as a full
service library. The Library
Board has approved the Strate-

gic Plan and the City Council endorsed the Plan. The Board submitted a list of facilities projects totaling seventy-seven million dollars for consideration to be on the next Capital Improvement Bond election, although it is unlikely that all of those projects will be included.

Library Administration— Kate Grav, the Interim Assistant Director for Public Services, introduced herself to the group and issued a heartfelt thank you to everyone for the encouragement and support the Friends groups give to the library staff. She announced that the "board book" for toddlers that the Library Foundation created in collaboration with the San Antonio Museum of Art is on sale in bookstores and at HEB. The Library will also be collaborating with UT Health Science System on the annual "One Community One Book" initiative, and the book will be Barefoot Heart by Elva Trevino Hart. Mollie Pruitt Branch will open as a full service branch on Nov. 1. Kate also reported that the Bond issue will come before the voters in May of 2012, which means a final list of projects will be due by Jan. of

2012.

BookCellar—Linda Arronge reported that the BookCellar sales for September will be the 600s and for October will be Adult Fiction. The BookCellar committee discussed buying a cabinet to display more expensive books but felt the cost was too high.

Membership—Christie
Smith made a comparative
report of our membership now
to that of a year ago. This
month's report will also be used
as a baseline for comparison in
2012. Our push in 2012 will be
to reach the 1000 member

mark, and we only need 100 new members to meet that goal if we retain this year's membership. Of the 900 current members there are 329 with no email address on our records.

OLD BUSINESS

Arts & Letters Awards and Reception—Linda Arronge invited everyone to the Arts and Letters Reception on Oct. 30 at 2:00 in the auditorium of the Central Library. This year the committee had 11 nominations from which to choose and made a selection of three highly qualified recipients.

SAPL Strategic Plan—As stated previously, the Strategic Plan has been approved and is available online for review.

Nancy Gandara suggested that FOSAPL members read over the "Areas of Strategic Focus" pages, which she distributed, so we could discuss at our next meeting how FOSAPL members might better fit into the Strategic Plan.

NEW BUSINESS

Consideration of Bylaws— Nancy Gandara introduced several members of the Friends of the Parman Branch who were in attendance: Katherine Lavender (President), Marian Martinello (Book Sale Coordinator), and Ronnie Retzloff, and said that the group's members were quite enthusiastic about joining FOSAPL. Mary McAfee made a motion that we accept the Bylaws of the Parman Branch Friends Group. Pat **Mendiola** seconded the motion. and the vote to accept was unanimous.

The Brook Hollow Friends held their semi-annual Book Sale on Saturday, Oct. 15.

With over 13,000 books to choose from, the sale was a huge success resulting in total sales of \$3,051.60. In addition, 35 of our 81 members volunteered for the sale.

The Friends had their regular business meeting on Monday, Oct. 17. It was announced that with the recent Book Sale, a total of \$21,663.34 is available to assist with the needs of the branch. Accordingly, the Board authorized the Manager, **Beth Schorlemer** to proceed with the purchase of an RFID pad, barcode scanners and receipt printers, a back up battery for DLA, and more small carts for shelving books.

Ms. Schorlemer will also request estimates for providing sun screening material on the large windows on the north side of the library. A motion was made and passed to authorize overall spending for these items not to exceed \$7,500. Other improvements will be considered at a later date. The Landscape Committee was also authorized to provide minor maintenance items to the landscaping previously provided by the Friends. An election of officers was held for 2012-2014. President Bruce Gill, and Treasurer Marilou Smith were reelected to an additional term, and Katherine Kay and Ann **Springer** were elected as the new Vice-President and Secretary respectively.

The next Book Sale will be March 24, 2012. The Friends will also provide a staff appreciation dinner on Feb. 24, 2012.

Books were selected on Saturday after the full-day sale to hold for addition to the Book Nook cart. Our "I GO TO IGO" backpacks and bags will now be for sale from the Book Nook. They come in black and purple and are very popular. Ask at the front desk for details regarding their purchase.

Kathy Claspill, Branch Manager, reported that the library continues to be swamped with patrons. When we see staff sitting at the desk, some may think "is this all they do?" NOT! Kathy reported that each day the library pulls between 175 and 200 books to be placed on hold. In addition, they process between 10 and 18 crates of books each day. Not to mention all the reshelving AND programming. The good news is that a new children's librarian will soon join the staff. We look forward to providing funds for new programming. We voted to buy new tee shirts for the staff and FIBBERS. They'll have a surprise feature—to be reported on in the next SAPLings.

Report on Libraries in Rural Texas

P at and I recently took a trip vertically through Texas at the longitude roughly of Abilene. Along the way, we visited the libraries in a number of small Texas communities to see how they were doing. Going North, we traveled on US 83, the 2nd longest road in Texas (IH 10 is the longest). US 83 stretches from the valley to the Canadian border in North Dakota. Going south we traveled on US 283. The towns visited were Menard, Eden, Ballinger, Anson, Hamlin Guthrie, Paducah, Childress, Quanah, Vernon, Seymour, Throckmorton, Albany, Brady, and Mason. Of these towns we visited the Libraries in Eden, Ballinger, Paducah, Seymour, and Mason.

We found these libraries had a number of similarities and some interesting differences. Across the board all the Libraries were suffering from the withdrawal of state funding. In the next budget year the state has cut funding for Libraries by 88%. Included in the cuts are cuts for Interlibrary Loan and support for database access. As we saw, the effect of these cuts on the operation of small Libraries is devastating. One library that still had both city and county funding was operating with a budget of about \$33,000 a year. Another library in a nice new building it shared with the County Court had no money for purchasing new books.

Nearly every library was involved in selling books both through a shelf of books for sale and/or annual sales. The prices charged for the books ranged mostly from 50 cents to \$1. However, one Library charges \$3 for hardbacks. That Library had an interesting display strategy for their sale books. They were stored in a corner labeled "Cup and Chaucer." The coffee designation came from the fact that they had coffee and snacks for sale in the same corner.


At the other end of the spectrum was the library in Paducah, which is housed in the basement of the County Courthouse. This town is close to being a Ghost Town. Nearly all the stores around the town square were empty. We were told they have very few patrons except for tourists passing through. When they sold books, they sold them for 10 cents, but they have a hard time selling books. The feeling of the Librarian was the population reads but does not buy books. One town at this same end of the poverty spectrum had a sale which failed for lack of customers. Another Library had a sale where they sold books for 10 cents each and a dollar a bag, but they were only able to make \$50. One year they tried to sell books by the pound.

Nearly every Library had a Friends group with varying levels of dues. In several cases, the Friends groups were vital in getting additional funding for the Library. Every Library had some access to computers for its patrons. However, in some cases not all computers had access to the Internet.

F iscal Year 2012, that is. October 1 marks the beginning of a new fiscal year for the City of San Antonio, and this seems like a good time to reflect on the past twelve months.

Since September 30, 2010, the Library has opened two beautiful new branches in previously underserved areas of the commu-

nity, one on the far south side and one on the far north side. Both were warmly welcomed and are seeing record usage. If you haven't yet visited the Mission Branch Library or the Parman Branch Library, I urge you to do so.

Much of the past year has been occupied by development of the Library's new Strategic Plan, and we have kept you up to date on our progress both here and through the local news media. I am pleased to announce that the Library Board of Trustees approved the plan on August 24, and that City Council ratified it on September 15. As we wind up this phase, I would like to express my appreciation to **Tom Frost** and the members of the Leadership Advisory Committee, who provided invaluable input; the task force of Library managers, who oversaw the project; and the work teams, who developed the exciting initiatives outlined in the Strategic Plan. We now move into implementation of those initiatives, beginning with our Staff Development Day training session in October. Watch for more to come!

Finally, I want to say thank you to a number of people. As I have often noted, the past several years have been hard for public libraries. However, San Antonio has been fortunate to have farsighted, enlightened leadership on the Library Board of Trustees, in the City Manager's Office, and from the Mayor and City Council. On September 15, the same day that Council ratified our Strategic Plan, they also approved the City's Fiscal Year 2012 budget. That budget included increased appropriations for the Library, including more funding to purchase materials and funding to grow the Library's early literacy initiatives. Without the support of the City's leadership echelons and Library stakeholder groups, including the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library, the San Antonio Public Library Foundation and all of you who appreciate and use the Library, such progress would not have been possible. On behalf of the community, I say thanks again, and pledge that we will continue to live up to our new mission statement:

The San Antonio Public Library changes lives through the transformative power of information, imagination and ideas.

Getting to Know Your Friends

John Igo

There was no library where John Igo lived as a child, but a Book Mobile came and allowed you to take out 7 books at a time. John was a prolific reader and 7 books was not enough! Therefore, he got library cards for his parents so he could take out 21 books at a time.



John started his working connection with the library in the 7th grade at Lockhill Elementary School. He and his best friend checked out books for the whole school. Remember when the books had pockets and cards that were removed? They collected signatures, stamped the cards and checked them back in when returned. John remained friends with this boy all his life, and at one point John was writing love letters for the friend in the manner of **Cyrano de Bergerac**.

When John was 17 and in his first year at college, he was a Page at the Hertzberg Library. This was a paid position and he was recommended for it by his teachers. At that time, the public was only allowed on the first floor where they had the Fiction and Popular Biographies. When a patron wanted information on a certain subject, they wrote their question down and it was handed to a Page who researched and located the subject and brought back the book with the answer. The Librarian then wrote out the answer and gave it to the patron. It was at the Hertzberg that John met Leah Carter Johnston who started the Friends of the

San Antonio, and a few years later, she invited John to serve on the Board.

While in college, John would stop at the Westfall Library as it was in his path going home. Later, when he was at Trinity University, he used the Landa Library and of course he was involved

again. He remembers the Friends bought new carpeting for 2 floors at Landa. Later, he frequented the Cody branch too.

From 1976-1996, John was the Manager of the Theater Archives at the Hertzberg. During this time there was a huge Shakespeareana collection and also a comprehensive collection of Fiesta items including the Fiesta Dinner Theater. At one point in time, it was determined there no

longer was space for these items and they were headed for the dumpster. John got busy on the phone and invited local universities to come and put some of these items in their collections.

John attends as many of the Igo Friends meetings as he is able. His pet project is the puppet theater. John thinks puppets are a great way to get children interested in theater. He owned a set of Faust puppets and felt they needed to be shared; so he has donated them to the Igo Library. (See the photos on p. 7)

I took John's picture in his favorite spot in the Igo Branch, where he worked on his last 2 books and a 2-act play, which are at the Publishers right now. There is a section in the middle of the library with 4 rows of tables between the stacks. John always sits at the 2nd or 3rd table. You might find him there this week, working on a grammar reference book for adults.

How YOU Are Helping the Library and Friends Nancy Gandara

We all know that the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library is a "membership" organization, and that there is an annual Membership Drive. But do you know how the Friends' money is spent?

Of a \$15 individual Adult membership, \$5 is allocated to the Branch or Interest Group that the member designates. The remaining \$10 is used to cover expenses of the organization, and contributes toward the annual gift to the Library system.

Even organizations that are run by volunteers have expenses, and FOSAPL and the BookCellar are no exception. The Treasurer's Report that is printed in every issue of *SAPLings* itemizes those expenses.

- FOSAPL expenses include fees paid to professional accountants; expenses related to the Arts & Letters Award program; insurance for the Board members and BookCellar; preparation, printing and mailing SAPLings; seed money for new interest groups; and gifts to SAPL when a Life Member dies.
- BookCellar expenses include: salary and benefits for a part-time (20 hrs/wk) manager; canvas bags for resale; office supplies and expenses related to book sales; display equipment; and an appreciation lunch for the 50 volunteers who keep it open 32 hrs/wk, sort books, and do semi-annual sales. The most important "expense" is the Friends' annual gift to SAPL. The



Library Director has used that gift for public programming, marketing, and staff development and training—areas not covered by the City Budget. During 2011, we will give \$42,000. Most of our revenue is from sales at the BookCellar, thanks to our dedicated volunteer workers and regular shoppers—but your membership fee is an important part of keeping the Friends growing, so be sure to join today!


