This year's awardees were Paula Allen, Ken Frazier, and Jasmina Wellinghoff. FOSAPL president Linda Nairn presented each awardee a plaque.

aula Allen is a columnist, historian, and story teller in answering any query posed about what, where, why, when, and how this or that became a puzzle part of San Antonio's past, present, and future. As noted in her acclaimed new book, *San Antonio, Then and Now*, Paula has written her weekly column on local and Texas history for the San Antonio *Express-News* since 1992. September 17, 2006

Call to Order: Linda Nairn, President, called the meeting to order at 2:01.

Board of Directors and Officers present: Linda Nairn, Robert LaCaff, Sheila Figueroa, Nancy Gandara, Barbara Isner, Vera Banner, Betty Kelly Berry, Pat Brown, Lee LaCaff, Aaron Konstam, Maria Pfeiffer, Rowena Rodgers, Anna Cleve, Ronnie Retzloff, Pat Konstam, Alan Cutler, Josie Martinez, Bruce Gill, Libbie Roussin, Dorothy Smith, Pat Mendiola, Lora Eckler, Joyce Garcia, Cathy Dean, Tom Anderson, Leila Heilman, Pat Cummins, and Mary McAfee.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved and recorded.

President's Report: Linda **Nairn** reported there has been a proposal to change the name of the Oakwell Library. The Friends will support the decision of the Library Board. Linda worked at the Book Cellar and visited Bazan Library. Xavier Garcia read his children's book, Lucha Libre (which means Mexican wrestling). Hispanic Heritage is celebrated this month. Linda is attempting to get a Friends group started at Landa Branch, and she will visit Pan American and Collins Gardens libraries. Cortez is having some difficulty starting a Friends group. Linda attended two city council meetings to speak about the proposed budget. The library received \$100,000 more than anticipated, and there was a matching grant.

Treasurer's Report: Nancy Gandara distributed a corrected report of June 30, 2006. A motion was passed unanimously to accept and file the Treasurer's Report. We received a \$277.91 check from Barnes and Noble—proceeds of an event held by the Writer Friends. She reminded all that FOSAPL pays 8.125% sales tax for all branch book sales.

REPORTS:

Library Board: Jean Brady, vice-chairman, reported. Budget hearing for the library—many people sent emails and letters and made telephone calls. The money received will be used for books and materials. The Oakwell Branch proposed name change is a difficult decision to make.

Library Administration: Aubrey George reported that this is Hispanic Heritage month. Sandra Cisneros will speak on Sept. 23 at 10:00 at the Central Library. Aubrey thanked the Friends for attending council meetings and voicing their opinions. The library received \$750,000, a net gain of \$250,000. Computer training will be transferred to the Dept. of Community Initiatives. The print shop was eliminated. Security services are now privatized. There was a slight reduction in custodial services. Overall, it was a fairly successful budget. In the next two or three months there will be an

RFID (radio frequency identification) system with a tag placed in each book. The new system will print a receipt, and there will be self check-out stations.

Library Foundation: Lucy

Gale reported there would be a press conference about library card sign up. AT&T is sponsoring a children's sleep over at the library. A children's book mascot will visit all schools in the SAISD. There was an Express-News children's workshop at the Sky Room at Incarnate Word. On Sept. 30, the Houston Street Fair will be from noon to 6:00 with a book donation drive to benefit the Friends. There will be an onsite bookstore to wrap up events for 1 Book~1 San Antonio. Hispanic Heritage month: \$9,000 to help with printing costs. Univision to show commercial (PSA). Received \$40,000 from initiatives for the Little Read Wagon program. Received \$110,000 for apprentice program for the Dept. of Community Initiatives, 18-23 year olds to work as interns/ apprentices in library system. Received money for Cortez library. Projects for 2007: SAMA, Southwest School of Arts, March 2007-Literary Arts Festival, April 2007 – Latino Art Auction.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Arts and Letters: Alan Cutler announced the names of the three award honorees, Paula Allen, Ken Frazier, and Jasmina Wellinghoff. The ceremony will be Oct. 22. Alan designed a poster to

questions addressed to her and researching and developing a story in response is her gifted journalistic forte. Questions may concern any subject, all time periods, any location, persons living or dead, collapsing structures, rusty gizmos, sinful deeds, thingamobs, blue books, and perhaps a paradox or two. Paula knows or researches all for an erudite answer, with pleasure, dedication, enjoyment, and intent to educate, clarify, and amuse in answering a reader's query. She writes with great assurance, sincerity, clarity, and humor, making her columns a mustread. Her readers remember and ask about things they wondered about, such as the little ice house where they met, and Paula touches upon (no, grabs and hugs) all of this local life and its aftermath. She educates and entertains her devoted readers in telling anything and everything about the historical, hysterical background of San Antonio, Texas. At the Arts & Letters awards, Paula treated the audience to a sampling of the various questions she has been asked over the years about San Antonio.

en Frazier, the Artistic Director and Producer of the Barshop JCC Sheldon Vexler Theatre and its Children's Theatre, is credited with their creation and development into two of San Antonio's finest theatrical venues. After 10 years of teaching all aspects of theater arts in San Antonio high schools, he came upon the under-construction Vex. In the past eight seasons, he has directed or produced more than 50 dramas, comedies, and musicals in filling the Vex Round and its Children's Theatre with cheering audience standing ovations. The Vex has been awarded more than 35 ATAC Globe Awards for excellence in the dramatic arts, Much of the success of the Vex is attributed to what excites Ken



about producing theatre—scripts that have a moral or ethical message tucked away, and theater's ability to communicate universal ideas with plays and musicals that provide the audience an opportunity to look at themselves and the human condition, our social strength and weakness to recognize through the theatre art form what we are capable of. Most rewarding however is the collaborative nature unique to theatre involving many artists working together to create a unified work of art. And the most crucial ingredient, the audience, where every



good piece of theatre involves a deserved exchange of energy and communication between the cast, the crew, and their audience. Ken discussed his productions at the Sheldon Vexler Theater and his extensive involvement in the production details. Ken brought some models of his set designs along with pictures of his past productions.

asmina Wellinghoff quietly considers herself first as a journalist who has been covering the San Antonio arts scene for nearly 20 years. She was theatre critic for the San Antonio Light, an award-winning feature writer for numerous publications, and a commentator and arts reviewer on television and radio. She is the author of more than a thousand articles and hundreds of reviews. Her drama and arts reviews are frequently featured in the San Antonio Express-News. Currently, she is the senior writer and arts columnist for the San Antonio Woman. She strongly advocates accuracy in reporting and fairness in opinion journalism and believes that a supportive and knowledgeable press is the advancement of the arts and culture. Her award-winning writing as a contributing editor has been reprinted in many local, state, national, and interna-



tional publications. In 1990, she founded the Alamo Theatre Arts Council and its ATAC Globe Award to recognize superior achievements in San Antonio theatrical production and performance and setting standards for exceptional professional quality theatre in the city. The prestigious annual Globe Award for Theatre/Lifetime Achievement is named in her honor. She is a published poet and holds a Ph.D. in Polymer Sciences and diplomas to teach Italian language, art, culture, architecture, and classical literature. Jasmina read some of her poems, including new ones that were being read in public for the first time.

Lucy Gale prepared a very nice reception with ample food and drink. This year's ceremony kept up the tradition of having an enjoyable, interesting, and meaningful event.
