Board Meeting July 19, 2009

The Friends of the Library meeting was called to order at 2 p.m. by President Nancy Gandara. It was held at Semmes Library. The roll was called, and a quorum was present. Mary McAfee moved and Sue Ratliff seconded the motion that the minutes be approved as printed in the SAPLings.

President's Report—Nancy Gandara. Gandara reported that the San Antonio Area Foundation presented the John Igo Library with a \$500 donation. The contribution was a gift from John and Judy Mumma. Gandara announced that the "Show Me the Money" workshop held on July 18 was a great success.

Treasurer's Report—**Judy Wilson.** Wilson presented a copy of the expense report. It was reviewed and accepted. It will be filed for audit. The expense report will be printed in the next issue of *SAPLings*.

Library Board of Directors
President—Jean Brady. The
Central Library will be under
renovation in the fall. In July,
Brady attended the annual Urban
Library Council (ULC) meeting in
Chicago where she received the
ULC Urban Players Award. Brady
thanked the group for sending so
many congratulatory notes and
letters regarding her award.

Library Director Report—
Ramiro Salazar. Salazar and library representatives attended the 5th Anniversary of the Guerra Library on Saturday, July 18. Salazar announced that the Library will be closed for a staff development day on Wednesday, October 12. He announced that the library and all departments were asked to make budget cuts. This is 10% for non-uniform departments. Salazar attributed 70% of the budget to personnel.

Opening dates for two new libraries will be delayed by three months in 2010. There will be cuts in services and hours at library branches. Roosevelt

might open the same hours as Reagan. The Budget will be submitted in August and each district will hold a meeting. The Council will then tweak some projects.

The Foundation—Sarah Swinney. The Foundation is trying to tap into funds from the stimulus plan. The Project Global Giving was a success. We came in 7th. The Spanish Heritage will present Josephina Lopez author of Real Women Have Curves on September 27. On October 3, we will celebrate Children's Books. The program will be at the Pearl Stables and will cost \$25 per person. There will be many writers present, and there will be activities for the children.

Book Cellar-Aaron Konstam. The Cellar raised approximately \$8,100 at its annual Big Sale. We received one thousand boxes of books from St. Phillip's College. The Policy and Mission statements for the Book Cellar were discussed. Copies of the statements were circulated to give members an opportunity to review existing policies. Ronnie Retzloff moved that we approve the Policy and Mission statement. Jackie Fremming seconded the motion. Mary McAfee called for questions. Concern was expressed and it was suggested that two people count the money each day and sign the slip showing the amount. It was stated that it was already done. It was approved as presented.

Memorials—Sheila Figueroa. Figueroa reported sending seven letters to acknowledge donations and memorials. A "thank you" letter was sent to the Ruth McLean Bowman Bowers Foundation. The foundation made a generous donation of \$1,000.

Memberships Report—
Claudia Kohler. A printed report was presented by Kohler. We had 27 new members that

joined at the Book Cellar Pre-Sale. We currently have 834 members.

Directory— **Robert LaCaff.** The directory is roughly 85–90% completed. LaCaff has requested that each library branch designate a contact person.

Arts and Letters—Linda Arronge. Arronge said the Arts and Letters Ceremony will be held on Sunday, October 25, 2009 at the Central Library.

Budget Committee—Judy Wilson will serve as Chairperson. Committee members will include: Linda Nairn, Sue Ratliff, Cynthia Talboys, Aaron Konstam, and Robbi Rupert.

Task Force for the Texas Library Association in April 2010—Denise Barlow will serve as Chairperson. Task Force committee members will include: Cathy Dean, Evelyn Bonavita and Linda Arronge.

2010 Recruitment—Nancy Gandara will serve as Chairperson. Committee members will include Denise Barlow, Cynthia Talboys, Claudia Kohler and Pat Peak.

Nominating Committee for 2010—Bruce Gill will serve as Chairperson. Committee members will include: Robbi Ruppert and Mary McAfee.

Newsletter—Cathy Dean.
The committee is looking for new members. They will meet August 3 or 4. They are flexible about the time, date, and place.

The meeting was then adjourned by President Nancy Gandara.



s Director of the San Antonio Public Library, I would like to thank the Friends of the San Anto-



nio Public Library for offering me this opportunity to communicate with you. The members of the Friends, and those who may not be members but who support your work in many

other ways, contribute to the strength and vitality of the Library—and that means a better community for everyone.

I thought it would be appropriate to use my first column to give you an overview of the Library and what we do. This will give you an idea of where your contributions go. Succeeding columns will focus on the many services the Library has to offer.

The San Antonio Public Library, founded in 1903, is a department of the City of San Antonio, supported by the City General Fund and a contribution from Bexar County, supplemented by donations from organizations such as FOSAPL and the San Antonio Public Library Foundation.

The chances are that wherever you may be, you are not far from a branch of the San Antonio Public Library. The Library has 24 locations around the city: the Central Library, 22 branch libraries, and one public school-library partnership. There are two new branches beginning construction and scheduled to open in early 2011, and a second school-library partnership is scheduled to open in October 2009. These libraries, together with a bookmobile, serve all of Bexar County, an area with a population of around 1.5 million people. The Library's collection houses more than two million items, including books, newspapers, magazines, DVDs, CDs, videos, and databases, in several languages.

One way in which libraries have changed is by incorporating more technology into their resources and services. The Library

ood news for people who collect videos and books on tape: Central Library is thinning its stock of video movies, instructional videos and books on tape and donating them to the Book Cellar. The store's media shelves are running out of room so we've put them on sale. Popular video movies cost \$1. Lesser known films and nonfiction (exercise, travel, sports, etc.) are two for 50¢. Books on tape (both fiction and nonfiction) are buy one at the regular price and get a second one of equal or lesser value free. The regular price is 25¢ per cassette, typically \$1 to \$2 for a complete recorded book.

The buy-one-get-one-free clearance sale on books (the printed kind) in September and October includes hardback adult fiction of all kinds—novels, mysteries, science fiction, westerns, and large print—and the 800 Dewey Decimal series. The 800s cover literature: plays, poetry, humor, anthologies, authors, literary his-

tory and criticism, and books on how to write or make speeches.

Nine people who joined the Book Cellar volunteer staff during the past year received purple aprons embroidered with their names and their first 50-hour patches at a Volunteer Appreciation Potluck Supper on July 27. They are: Virginia Bowden, Faye Hallford, Gail Long, Andrea Mason, Robert Mason, Sue Mersinger, Chuck Olson, Judy Olson, and Ann Springer. "Together they donated 1,100 hours during the year ended June 1," said Jim Wogstad, who calculates volunteer hours. The store's longer-term volunteers earned 143 additional 50-hour patches, representing 7,150 hours donated during the past year. Four volunteers who have donated more than 2,000 hours each to the Book Cellar over several years received gold aprons. They are Jim Wogstad, Jeanne Papa, Richard Morales, and Aaron Konstam. Lucille Teeter and Linda Arronge or-



ganized the celebration, which was attended by 33 volunteers and spouses.

Pat Brown, one of the Book Cellar's longest active volunteers and member of the Book Cellar Committee, has retired. Her fellow Tuesday volunteers are planning a lunch in her honor at a date to be announced. Pat also is a past president of FOSAPL.

he Latino Collection at the San Antonio Public Library now has an online counterpart - open 24 hours a day! The Library has added subscriptions to the Latino Literature and the Latin American Women Writers databases from Alexander Street Press. Both collections feature thousands of pages of fiction, poetry, essays and plays, much of it never before published. To see what's included, go to www.mysapl.org and click on "Databases" at the top of the page, then click on the name of the database.

The Latino Collection is a cultural and educational resource which chronicles and celebrates the literature, heritage, and contemporary life of Latinos in the United States. Though the majority of this collection focuses on the Mexican American or Chicano experience, materials about Puerto Rican, Cuban American and other Latin American heritages are also included in the collection. The collection was established in 1996 and currently includes more than 7,000 volumes.

SAPL Audiobooks Now in iPod and Mac Formats!

Pod users can now download and enjoy almost every single audiobook on Overdrive! That's right—Overdrive struck a deal with the vast majority of publishers allowing the conversion of .wma file audiobooks for a variety of Apple products.

Macintosh users can utilize a special Mac-compatible version of the Overdrive Media Console and download and enjoy the mp3-file audiobooks from Overdrive and NetLibrary—a total of over 1200 audiobooks to choose from.

To get started, you'll need a San Antonio Public Library card. Go to "<u>Downloadables</u>" on the San Antonio Public Library home page (http://www.mysapl.org/), then click on "Digital Media Downloads" under the "OverDrive Digital Library" header. Follow the instructions to start downloading books, music and more to your Apple-compatible device.

Don't have a library card? All you need is proof of residence in Bexar County and a photo ID. Stop by any location of the San Antonio Public Library and you can leave with your own library card!

Can't visit a library just now? Go to "How do I get a library card?" You'll be walked through signing up online, and will be able to access most of our online resources, including downloadables, right away! Come by a San Antonio Public Library location within 30 days to get your hard-copy library card.

(Of course, if you have an MP3 or other device, you can get the same great stuff! Just click on the "Downloadables" link above and follow the directions.)

And the best part? All of this is free! Happy reading—or listening!

has more than 463 public-access computers. This is especially important in our community for many San Antonians, the Library is their only access to computers and the Internet. The Library's computers are used by students to do homework, by job-searchers to look for employment and prepare their résumés, by entrepreneurs to research their businesses, by genealogy enthusiasts to do family research, and by travelers to check their email. In 2007 we added Wi-Fi capability, so that customers can use their personal wireless-enabled devices to access the Internet at any Library location. RFID (radio-frequency identification) and self-check-out have improved security of library materials and shortened lines at the circulation desks.

Overseeing all these services, and setting policy for the San Antonio Public Library, is the responsibility of the City-Charter-created Board of Trustees. The eleven members of the Board are appointed by the Mayor and City Council and serve, not just in an advisory capacity, but as a governing body, responsible to the community and to the City Council for the success of the public library.

Among other responsibilities, the Library Board of Trustees submits a budget request to City Council each year during budget deliberations. For Fiscal Year 2009, the Library's operating budget was \$29.885 million. Even though recent years have seen increases in the Library's budget, San Antonio's per-capita expenditures on library services still place it almost at the bottom of the list of major cities in Texas, behind Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston.

Unfortunately, the current economic downturn has had an effect on San Antonio, as on so many cities across the nation. We are in better shape than many other municipalities, but loss of revenue will affect the Library's Fiscal Year 2010 budget. For the upcoming fiscal year, the Library Board and staff decided our main priority would be keeping the book budget intact, and we worked very hard to develop other budgetary measures that would have as little impact on public service as possible. I am proud to say that I believe we achieved that goal, and, while some hours may be cut at branch libraries, if City Council approves the proposed budget we will be able to open all libraries seven days a week, an improvement that many customers have requested.

Clearly, we have many challenges ahead. Like so many libraries across the country, the San Antonio Public Library is in an era of transition. We can meet our challenges with greater confidence because of your support. Thank you and stay tuned for updates.

High Tech Book Sales

ave more fun preparing for book sales: Scan them!

Friends groups that presort for sales can easily increase their fun and fund\$ with very little extra effort if they scan while sorting.

Since January 2008, Maverick Friends have sold 266 books to Box 5, Inc. for \$672.39 plus postage, or an average net of \$2.57 each. The best price on a single book was \$11.05, and the lowest was 52¢.

Scanning is easily added to your sorting routine. Just unpack the books, make it easy to see the ISBN on the back, scan the books, put those that are "hits" aside, and continue sorting as usual.

At the end of the day, make a Scanner Tally Sheet that includes the following (this will be helpful later):

- ISBN
- Title
- Book Price [or Book Price and Postage Allowance; or the Total of the two]
- The scanner's chip date
- The date the scan was completed

Using the information from the tally sheet, create a record like the Scanner Tally for your Treasurer. This makes it easier to decide which books to mail and

creates a record of what was shipped and when, and the expected price for each item.

Pack the books tightly. Fill "holes" with paper or clean plastic grocery bags. Bags are lighter than paper and just as effective. NO PEANUTS!!! Enclose a packing list. Use enough tape to seal the box securely—it will be thrown, dropped, shoved against hard objects, and moved with equipment that can snag an opening or loose flap.

Try to keep the boxes between 29 and 40 pounds. Lower weights cost your group more than Box 5 pays for mailing. Boxes over 40 pounds are harder for you, postal employees, and Box 5 personnel to handle.

The \$185 deposit for the scanner is fully refundable when it is returned in good working condition. The scanner uses a secure digital memory card that must be updated according to Box 5's schedule. The updates require a Windows PC with broadband (DSL, Cable, T1, etc.) internet access.

Cash4Books.net online at http://www.cash4books.net and BookTurtle.com online at http://bookturtle.com are two more examples of internet book buyers. Unlike Box5, they do not offer a scanner. To sell books to them, go to either website and follow the instructions for entering an ISBN to find out whether they are currently buying the books you want to sell.

We try to keep the plastic membership displayer filled with envelopes, and we stamp BH on the branch line before putting them out. Whenever a patron asks staff members about the Friends, they get the person's name and e-mail address, give it to me, and I contact him/her right away.

Newsletters for Quick Outreach to Members

I started doing our newsletter a year or so after we organized our branch group. I was the next president after that, (4 years) and since then **Richard Bowser** and I have been doing the newsletter while he's been President. It's basically the same every time—book sale information, a treasurer's report, renewal reminder in the fall one, etc. I write the book sale article and a few other things and then e-mail it to him to finish up. We e-mail it

to about half our members and mail out the rest. I have the newsletter set up on my computer with the heading and columns, so it doesn't take me more than a half hour or so to write it. We do them just twice a year, about three weeks before each book sale. (We also have our library board rep., city council person, and FOSAPL president on the list so that they all get our newsletter but no phone calls.)

Can You Hear Me Now?

We also have a telephone committee: we count up the members, excluding those with e-mails and also the callers, divide into three parts, leave the lists in our closet at the library, and the callers pick them up. Three people call all our members (except those with e-mail addresses) to remind about helping with the book sales, meetings, and the yearly staff appreciation dinner. The rest of the members

are notified by e-mail. We have a large percentage of renewals, even among members who never come to meetings, etc., and I think this is because we do a good job of keeping in touch with every-

Usually they just leave messages on answering machines. For several years we had a member who was pretty much housebound because he was taking care of his wife who had Alzheimer's.

Email

I get an update of the membership from Claudia Kohler about a month before a sale or our dinner for the staff and update my computer list. We have membership lists available at our meetings and at book sale set-up times for anyone who wants one. The land-scape committee and the now-defunct kitchen committee really made use of the e-mails!


