Dear Friends,

San Antonio LOVES its Library! A public opinion survey that was conducted in October 2008 by Baselice & Associates has shown that a majority of Bexar County residents consider the library system to be a valuable community resource. The survey (which was commissioned by the San Antonio Public Library Foundation) found that 91% of the respondents think the Library is a good use of public funding. That's important to know, as a proposal to dedicate a fraction of the City sales tax to improve library support has been made and may be put to a vote in November. More information about this will be available as the plans develop, and I look forward to hearing your discussions about it at the Friends' group meetings.

The survey also found that 80% of the respondents said that it is important to have a Library card. The Library kicked off a campaign to have at least a million card-holding borrowers during 2009, and the Friends can certainly help!

I know that *you* are each "One in a Million," but have you recruited a coworker, spouse, grandchild, or neighbor yet? Sometimes a person doesn't have a current borrower's card because he doesn't know where the closest branch library is located, or he feels guilty because of a long-overdue book: take him by the hand to meet the friendly staff in our convenient and modern facilities!

Or perhaps your friend would prefer to go for a "virtual" visit: look for the redesigned and refreshed Library website at www.mysapl.org by mid-March. Although the Library staff has been great about creating the pages for us, volunteers are needed to keep it updated, so please contact me if you have web design talent and experience.

Don't forget to join your neighbors in The Big Read by checking out your own copy of *Fahrenheit 451* by **Ray Bradbury**, this Spring!

Friends of the San Antonio Public Library ANNUAL MEETING January 18, 2009

No roll call was taken.

Call to Order: Linda Nairn, President, called the meeting to order at 2:10 p.m. in the Central Library Auditorium.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as written.

President's Report: Linda Nairn stated that she has enjoyed being President. Linda apologized for not sending out the agenda earlier in the month to this wonderful group. During her four years she had certain goals in mind. She wanted a Friends group in each branch. That is a goal that she wants the Friends to continue to have. Nine Friends groups have started up in the last four years. Three branch libraries were opened. Linda plans on taking a short sabbatical to enjoy her two grandchildren.

Treasurer's Report: Nancy **Gandara** distributed copies of her report through December 31, 2008. Nancy stated that FOSAPL and the branch groups had contributed more than \$137,680 to the San Antonio Public Library. The "umbrella" organization of the Friends provided \$40,000 for programming support. Another \$40,000 was dedicated to staff training and travel, and \$3,600 was given to purchase a mobile sound amplification system for use throughout the library system. For most of 2008 there were 19 groups of Friends that are affiliated with different branches and two specialinterest groups (Texana/ Genealogy and the Writers' Friends); this is an increase of 4 groups over the year before. Their contributions to their libraries totaled \$54,000. which was 17% more than their contributions to their

libraries in 2007. Some of their money was used for the following purchases: McCre**less**—a chair with an arm for computer use; Semmes—trash receptacle for outside, die cuts, and standing signs; Guerramultimedia projector and a digital camera; Texana/ Genealogy—computer; Maverick-metal benches for outdoor use; Brookhollow-new cooktop, microwave oven, sink, tables, play station; Tobin at Oakwell—magazine holders for the teen area: Miscellaneous-a leaf blower and extension cords for landscape maintenance, color printers, ink cartridges, and cables for several branches; Christmas trees for new branches. Many of the groups show extra appreciation of our library staff members at holiday time by providing gift cards to Wal-Mart or HEB or with the always popular pizza parties. Nancy then distributed the 2009 Budget, which had been approved at the November 16, 2008, meeting of the Friends. Nancy thanked the committee members: Virginia Bowden, Judy Wilson, Aaron Konstam, Bruce Gill, and Linda Nairn, ex-officio.

REPORTS:

Library Administration: Ramiro Salazar, Library Director, took a few minutes to remember and acknowledge the life of Mike Sexton, who led the library system to expansion of multiple branches. He was a wonderful, generous man.

Ramiro stated that on Saturday, January 24, at 11:00 a.m., there will be a Kick-Off Library Card Campaign at Central Library. Scholastic is the main corporate sponsor for this

event. The goal is to have one million library cardholders in the city. Their goal is to register 300,000 for new library cards.

Ramiro has been asked by TLA to be a lead delegate, and he and a busload of people will be going to Austin on February 25 for Legislative Day.

There is construction planning for two new branch libraries. One branch is at the old Mission Drive-In site. There will be a community meeting at Gilbert Elementary School on Southcross Blvd. on January 28 at 6:30 p.m. The second new branch will be located about a quarter mile from the intersection of Blanco Road and Wilderness Oak, a ten-acre site donated by developer **Dan Parman**.

Also, in September 2009, a public library will open at Roosevelt High School. There will be better access and designated parking not available at Reagan High School. Ramiro reported that a local survey had been conducted and that 9 out of 10 people stated that libraries are very important. Majority agreed that funding libraries is a good use of tax dollars. Very positive responses were received.

Ramiro concluded his report by thanking the Friends for all of their support because it is truly appreciated. The staff training and development is very important. Ramiro also thanked the Friends' groups that provide support to the branches. Ramiro then recognized **Linda Nairn** for her wonderful leadership these past four years. Linda attended many meetings, appeared at City Council meetings, was

Library Board of Trustees Chair Jean Brady made the results of the survey public at a news conference at the Semmes Branch Library, 15060 Judson Road, on Friday, February 13, at 9:30 a.m. Ms. Brady was joined by District 7 City Council Representative Justin Rodríguez, District 10 City Council Representative John Clamp, Library Foundation Chair Gene Ames, Library Foundation President and CEO Kaye Lenox, and Friends of the San Antonio Public Library President Nancy Gandara.

Survey findings:

- Nearly nine in ten (89%) of Bexar County respondents said libraries are important to them.
- 98% of respondents believe the library is important to education.
- 96% believe the library is an important part of the City's image.
- 92% believe the library helps people advance in their careers as well as help businesses.
- 91% said the library is a good use of public funding.
- 72% would support designating sales tax revenues to generate revenue for the library.
- 90% think the library is interesting.
- 86% know the library provides more than just books.
- 80% of respondents say it is important to have a Library card.

Councilmen Clamp and Rodríguez noted that the survey numbers confirmed impressions developed during their years on City Council. "My service on City Council has shown me how important the San Antonio Public Library is to the educational and economic life of the City," said Councilman Rodríguez. "These numbers confirm that Councilman Clamp and I took the right step in sponsoring the 'Be One in a Million' campaign to sign up new Library cardholders."

Councilman Clamp noted, "The results of this survey show that the community believes the Library is an essential public institution. The survey also indicates that it is important to support and improve our Library system."

Following the announcement of the survey results, Library Board Chair **Jean Brady** went on to ask that the City Council include

the Library in a referendum on the remaining 1/8% of City sales tax capacity. "This rigorous survey of public opinion confirms what anecdotal evidence has told us for years," Ms. Brady said. "The data show that the Library continues to be a vital, integral part of the life of our community. It is crucial, especially during this economic downturn, that the City commit to continued strong funding of the Library."

She continued, "This survey shows that the public will support supplemental funding for libraries – 72% indicated such support. So what does this mean? It's obvious: it is the 1/8% sales tax which was promised to us nearly two years ago upon delivery of the report of the Library District Commission. With the full support of the Library Board and Library Foundation I am demanding today to be placed on the ballot for a part of the sales tax capacity which remains. It is time, and we are on a mission to improve education, literacy, and economic development for the city of San Antonio," said Ms. Brady.


