Friends of the San Antonio Public Library Board Meeting

Sunday, January 27, 2013, 2:00 p.m. Submitted by Anne Long

The Friends of the San Antonio Public Library met on Sunday, January 27, at 2:00 PM in the auditorium of the Central Library. Those present were: Nancy Gandara, Linda Arronge, Judy Wilson, Anne Long, Linda Nairn, Walter Ague, Arline Braswell, Shirley Coleman, Antoinette Franklin, Jackie Fremming, Bruce Gill, Delores Huber, Claudia Kohler, Marv McAfee, Bob Mason, Pat Mendiola, Patricia Peak, Ronnie Retzloff, Robbi Rupert, Ann Springer and Jill Zimmerman.

Everyone had a chance to meet and greet old friends and new members while enjoying delicious refreshments provided by the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library

Our guest speaker for the meeting was Library Director **Ramiro Salazar** who spoke of "Transforming San Antonio Public Library, One Year at a Time." Mr. Salazar applauded the Friends for their help in many of the projects, innovations, upgrades, and initiatives begun and completed since he started at SAPL as director, eight years ago.

Nancy Gandara called the business meeting to order at 3:00 p.m. The Minutes of the November 18, 2012, meeting were printed in the January/ February 2013 SAPLings.

Jackie Fremming moved and Linda Nairn seconded the motion that the Minutes be accepted as they appeared in the Newsletter. The motion passed.

President's Report - Nancy Gandara reflected on "That was the year that was," saying:

"At our January meeting, mystery writer **Jay Brandon** told us of his adventures in libraries throughout San Antonio, and we welcomed six new members to the FOSAPL board.

"In May, the citizens of San Antonio passed 'Proposition 4' of the 2012-17 Bond Issue, which will fund improvements to some libraries and will allow the construction of three new branch libraries in the areas that are currently under-served.

"During 2012, FOSAPL contributed \$50,000 to the San Antonio Public Library, which was used to support programs throughout the system. The majority was used to fund the Summer Reading Program for children and teens. The balance of the gift was used to fund other programs throughout the year, such as the library's Life Long Learning programs, Live Well Age Smart, which targets seniors and programs for jobseekers. Some of the Children's programs that benefited from Friends' funding were Dia De Los Niño's, Dinosaur Days, the Jingle Bell Jubilee or Jelly Bean events. Teen programs that we supported included Writing Workshops, Teen Craft Nights, and Science Programming.

"Collectively, our 23 branch Friends' groups contributed more than \$79,000 to their respective branch libraries, for program support and for items that ranged from outdoor seating benches to a Kindle Touch.

"Most of the branch groups have embraced the responsibility of stocking a Book Nook or cart that sells donated books on the honor system – and we thank **Marshall Mundorff** for having built most of the cash boxes that are in use!

"The BookCellar celebrated its 21st year in business, and our dedicated volunteers held both a successful Tent Sale in June and a half-price sale in early December.

"In October, the Arts and Letters Award was given to **Brenda Kingery**, who displayed her paintings and needlecraft; **Florence Byham Weinberg**, who read from a novel in-progress; and **Allan and Teri Pena Ross**, who enacted a scene from a production at the Classic Theatre.

"At our last Board meeting, we agreed to present some revisions to the FOSAPL Bylaws and Standing rules. Some of those revisions, such as the description of an Arts and Letters Committee, and Task Forces to conduct the annual Audit and to propose the operating budget, will clarify existing practices that are already being done. The additional language in Rule 6 that describes a new committee – the Website Committee – should take us in a direction that will enhance our marketing of our organization, improve access to information for our members, and finally allow our members to choose on-line renewal if they want to do that."

Nancy thanked everyone for all their help and hard work in 2012 and for that to come in 2013.

Treasurer's Report – Judy Wilson reported that the net assets for FOSAPL use are \$68,641.29 as of December 31, 2012. The FOSAPL income for 2012 was \$90,149.18 with expenses being \$75,110.39. The branches gave \$79,306.44 for library support and branch activities in 2012. Mary McAfee made a motion we accept the Treasurer's Report to file for audit. David White seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

BookCellar – Linda Arronge reported that the BookCellar sales are at \$81,000

as of the end of December 2012. Many duplicate books have been shared with branches for their book sales and everyone is encouraged to sign up and help with the Book Festival on April 13.

Membership – Christie Smith reviewed the process of consolidating and reporting membership information. She explained that all members will receive a postcard that acknowledges their joining or renewal, with a coupon good for a free book at the BookCellar.

OLD BUSINESS

Authorization of Budget Amount for "Library Support" for 2013 – Judy Wilson recommended the amount of \$35,000 for library support in 2013. Jackie Fremming made a motion we accept her recommendation. Jill Zimmerman seconded the motion, and, after some discussion, the motion passed.

NEW BUSINESS

Revision to Bylaws and Standing Rules, recommended by FOSAPL board – Allen Hildreth made a motion to accept the revisions to the Bylaws and Standing Rules as they appeared on the website and in the January/February 2013 issue of the SAP-Lings. Mary McAfee seconded the motion, and Nancy Gandara called for discussion. It was suggested that in Rule 1G under Membership the words "as appointed by the president" be added to clarify how the Membership Secretary is to be chosen. Adding the change was acceptable to Allen and Mary, and their motion passed. The Rule 1G under Membership will read:

"The membership Secretary, as appointed by the president, shall be responsible for keeping accurate records of member contact information making regular reports to the directors and Secretary of branch group Friends and for acquiring an adequate supply of materials needed to facilitate member recruitment. The Membership Secretary will coordinate and share information with the Newsletter and Website committee personnel as needed to ensure communication is available to all members."

Election of New Board members for 2013-2015 – **Mary McAfee** and **Arline Braswell** presented the nominees for officers for 2013-2015 and called for nominations from the floor. There being

no nominations from the floor, the slate remained:

Delores Huber made the motion we accept the nominees for office. **Walter Ague** seconded the motion, and the motion passed.

Mary and Arline presented the nominees for Board of Directors for 2013-2015 and called for nominations from the floor. Ronnie Retzloff nominated Beth Graham and Mary Ruth Baer, each of whom accepted nomination.

Linda Nairn and Linda Arronge presented engraved plaques to Nancy Gandara, Judy Wilson and Anne Long for their service on the Executive Board. Mary McAfee, on behalf of the members of FOSAPL, presented an engraved crystal gavel, purchased by Yolanda Kirkpatrick, to Nancy Gandara in recognition of her service as Treasurer (Jan. 2005-2009) and President (Jan. 2009-2013). **Pat Konstam** made a motion to adopt a Resolution of Appreciation to Nancy Gandara for her strong leadership of Friends of the San Antonio Public Library during the four years of her presidency. "We thank Nancy for initiating formal statements spelling out the relationship between FOSAPL and the Library System, for her steadfast support of the work of the BookCellar, for her effective representation of the Friends to the wider community, for her informative reports in *SAPLings*, for expanding the organization's communications with members and others, and for all the other work she has done to deepen the Friends' support of the Library System." There being unanimous seconds to this motion the motion passed.

Nancy thanked everyone for the help and support she has received during her years as President. She wished the new officers and board well and passed the gavel (the old wooden one) on to **Linda Arronge**. Linda called for a motion to adjourn. **Mary McAfee** made a motion the meeting be adjourned. **Bruce Gill** seconded the motion, and the meeting was adjourned.

Teen Services at Landa Library

Teen Services at Landa Library has outstanding programs developed and supported by teens.

The Landa Teen Library Leadership Council meets every week with a sense of purpose. The council members look to each other for planning and decisionmaking skills on the Tutoring for Young Children project, Pen Pal project, and the Teen International Club.

The Tutoring for Young Children is a program that has teen tutors that tutor children 5-11 years old\ weekly once a week. This program was created by **Maddie Carrola**, 15 years old, and supported by Bea Canales, Teen Liaison. Some of the council members who are tutors with the children's parents to help them succeed. Maddie was also the 2012 Library Champion.

As an example of leadership qualities in teens, **Maddie Carrola** took the challenge to contact the Toronto, Ontario Public Library teen tutoring program and interviewed the head of that program.

These teens communicate with the parents of these children to help them succeed.

The Council is preparing to have a Pen Pal exchange with the teens who tutor the Toronto Public Library children's program. The Landa Teen Council is planning on having a Facebook page and Skype session with the teens in Toronto.

The Teen International Club was started when a council member wanted to expand the awareness culture and language for teens at the library. **Rubi Jaimes**, 16 years old, has recruited, blogged, and developed an outline of programs that centers on cultural awareness.

The International Club is also planning a Pen Pal exchange program for teens in Japan.

We also have strong teens, on the council, who like to

Getting to Know Your Friends - Rowena Rodgers

Rowena Rodgers has been a Texan all her life. Born in Houston, she grew up in Crosby, went to the University of Texas for her Liberal Arts Degree, met and married Keith Rodgers in 1949, and moved to San Antonio.

They moved to the Dellview area in 1952 and live there today, although in a different home. Keith worked at Kelly Air Force Base in Civilian Personnel—what we call Human Resources today. Rowena started their family, three boys and one girl, and stayed at home to raise them.

After the children left home, Rowena did some substitute teaching and also helped produce some television shows at KLRN PBS. This interest grew



out of activity with the League of Woman Voters. Rowena was the President of that group from 1975-1977 and is still active with them today. You should find

pamphlets about voting issues at your library branches that are put out by this group.

The Westfall Library was built in 1963 and has been expanded twice—in 1971 and in 1995. The building has more than doubled in size. On June 2, Westfall will celebrate their 50 year anniversary. Staff is busy putting together plans for lots of kids activities, food, and,

of course, the Friends will be there. It's been whispered that they will have a 60's theme, including 60's music. Watch the *SAPLings* for more information as it comes in.

Westfall Friends was formed in 1992, and Rowena was the first President. She had already been volunteering at the BookCellar and was on the BookCellar committee through 2012. Recently, she agreed to be the President of Westfall for 2013. Several years ago, a dealer donated several boxes of comic books that were each encased in plastic covers. As a mother of a comic book collector, this could have meant some real "finds" for some lucky collectors as they only put covers on the good ones.

One time, the Friends found \$200 tucked into a donated book. Of course they had no way of knowing where it came from so considered it a special donation!

Rowena was one of the founders of her neighborhood association and is still involved with them today. She is also active at the Unitarian Universalist Church. Westfall Friends will benefit greatly by all of her volunteer experience.

B ookCellar sales totaled \$82,127 in 2012. That was an 11 percent increase from 2011, and the store's highest annual sales figure since 2008 in what may reflect an improving local economy. It's also better than the troubled book retailing industry as a whole did in 2012, when sales at brick-and-mortar bookstores fell 3 percent and sales of print books – including online sales – dropped 9 percent, according to the *Wall Street Journal*.

The BookCellar Committee has elected **Tom Nemeth** as its chair, succeeding **Linda Arronge**, who has stepped up to the bigger job of FOSAPL president. Linda, who headed the committee for the past year, will continue to serve on the committee as an *ex-officio* member and to work as a BookCellar volunteer. Tom has worked at the BookCellar since 1991, run dozens of branch book sales, and operated a used bookstore at McCreless Mall. He also is current president of Friends of McCreless and Friends of Memorial.

The BookCellar currently has a surplus of children's and young adult books and is able to donate some to branch sales. There's enough for each branch to take one or two boxes. Branch sale representatives should call BookCellar Manager **Monica Hernandez** at (210) 227-9519 to arrange a convenient time to pick them up. In addition, the BookCellar continues to have plenty of adult fiction and non-fiction available for branch sales to take.

The buy-one-get-one special for March is regularly priced adult hardback fiction, including novels, mysteries, science fiction, westerns and large print. In April, the BOGO will be regularly priced adult and children's Dewey Decimal 700s. This classification includes art, music, TV, movies, dance, theater, games and sports.

Rowena Rodgers has resigned from the BookCellar Committee to focus on her job as president of Friends of Westfall. She has served on the committee for the past 10 years, and her participation will be missed. She is continuing as a BookCellar volunteer.

ancy G. West's Aggie Mundeen mystery, Fit to Be Dead, has been nominated for the Lefty Award, which has been given annually since 1996 for the best humorous mystery novel of the year.


